Little Matter That the

ORDINANCE No. 116

To submit to the legal voters of  
the City of Hermiston Ordinance No.  
115 proposed by the common council  
and now on file with the City Rec-  
order at the regular election to be  
held in said city on the 4th day of  
November, 1924.

The City of Hermiston does ordain  
as follows:

Sec. 1. That at the regular elec-  
tion to be held in the City of Her-  
miston, Oregon, on Tuesday, the 4th  
day of November, 1924, between the  
hours of 8 o'clock A. M. and 8 o'clock  
P. M. of said day at the City Coun-  
cil room in the Library in said City  
there shall be submitted to the legal  
voters of said City, all measures that  
may be submitted and proposed by  
initiative petition and filed in the  
office of the City Recorder and also  
that certain Ordinance No. 115 pro-  
posed by the Common Council and  
approved by the Mayor and filed in  
the office of the City Recorder on  
October 1st, 1924, proposing to  
amend the Charter of said City by  
adding thereto section 134, which  
said measure, together with the bal-  
lot numbers and ballot title thereto  
is as follows:

Ballot Title  
The following is the form and

number in which the ordinance pro-  
posed by the Common Council will  
be printed on the official ballot:

REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE OF  
THE CITY OF HERMISTON BY THE  
COMMON COUNCIL.

Charter amendment separating the  
funds of the City Water System from  
all other funds of said City and pro-  
hibiting their use for any other pur-  
pose other than operation and main-  
tenance of said system, betterments  
and extensions thereto and for the  
purpose of creating a sinking fund  
for the payment of interest and prin-  
cipal of water bonds.

Vote Yes or No.

The full title and text of such  
measure is as follows:

ORDINANCE No. 115  
An ordinance to amend the Char-  
ter of the City of Hermiston by add-  
ing thereto section 134 and to sub-  
mit and refer this ordinance to the  
legal voters of said City for their ap-  
proval or rejection.

The City of Hermiston does ordain  
as follows:

Sec. 1. That the charter of the  
City of Hermiston be, and the same  
hereby is amended by adding thereto  
section 134 as follows: Sec. 134.  
All funds derived from the City  
Water System and all funds here-  
after placed in the fund of the City  
Water System shall be kept in a  
fund separate from all other City  
funds and shall not be used for any  
purpose other than for the expense  
of operating and maintaining said  
Water System and for betterments  
and extensions thereto and for the  
purpose of paying interest and prin-  
cipal on water bonds.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall be  
referred to the legal voters of the  
City of Hermiston for their approval  
or rejection at the next regular elec-  
tion to be held in this city.

Passed the Council this 1st day of  
October, 1924.

Sec. 2. The City Recorder shall  
cause to be published in the Hermis-  
ton Herald a complete copy of this  
ordinance together with the ballot  
title and ballot number of said meas-  
ure for at least two issues of said  
paper consecutively within the 30  
days prior to the date of said elec-  
tion.

Sec. 3. That whereas it is neces-  
sary and desirable that this measure  
be submitted to the people at the  
next regular election to be held on  
November 4, 1924, and it is neces-  
sary for the preservation of the peace,  
health and safety of the inhabitants  
of the City that this ordinance be in  
effect at once, an emergency is here-  
by declared to exist and this ordi-  
nance shall be in full force and ef-  
fect from and after its passage by  
the Council and approval by the  
Mayor.

A STATEMENT

Pendleton, Ore., Oct. 2, 1924.

To the Editor:

In order that the taxpayers may  
know the amount of work accom-  
plished by the present Sheriff of  
Umatilla county, I desire to submit  
the following figures:

Total number of prisoners in the  
county jail for four full years, 1917  
to 1920, 549; total number of pris-  
oners in county jail for three years  
and nine months during the present  
administration 1141. This means  
almost twice as many prisoners as  
there were during the term preced-  
ing mine. I have handled these  
prisoners without any increase of  
deputies but have used the same num-  
ber that was used two years ago.

Fines collected through the Sher-  
iff's office during Houser adminis-  
tration amount to over \$18,300.00.  
These fines are nearly all for viola-  
tion of the prohibition law. They  
are almost double any equal preced-  
ing period.

The taxpayers should understand  
that the Sheriff's office has collect-  
ed in this money but does not spend  
it. Under the present law a part of  
it is used for the enforcement of the  
prohibition law. It is spent by  
other officers, not by the Sheriff.  
Much of the prohibition enforce-  
ment work done by the other officers  
during the last two years was made  
possible by the successful prohibi-  
tion work done and by the fines col-  
lected through the Sheriff's office.  
The statement which has been made  
by some persons that "Houser does  
not do anything," is utterly false.  
It would be nearer the truth to say  
that "Houser has done everything  
that has been done," and this is so  
because the Sheriff's office has direct-  
ly done more than any preceding  
administration and by means of fines  
collected has made it possible for  
other officers to carry on prohibi-  
tion work.

The taxpayers should know that  
the Sheriff's duties have increased  
in almost every department. New  
forms and kinds of taxes must be col-  
lected. The safety of the highway,  
arrest of speeders, etc., has grown  
to be a constant problem. The Sher-  
iff now handles automobile licenses.  
This requires much time. These  
matters together with court work,  
the increased number of prisoners,  
and the increased duties brought  
about by the enforcement of the pro-  
hibition law and general work, have  
practically doubled the work of the  
Sheriff's office since 1920. There is  
no increase in the number of regu-  
lar deputies. Some special help has  
been employed in connection with  
the tax collections and office work.  
This is unavoidable and is done  
at the lowest cost consistent with  
good service.

I have made this good record by  
staying on the job almost twenty-  
four hours per day. No man can  
stay with the work more closely than  
I do. No Sheriff before has done  
so much work at so low a cost. No  
one else can do the work better for  
less money. No other person seeking  
the sheriff's office is in better touch  
with its problems than I am. I have  
not had the best support in law en-  
forcement from some of the other  
officials but I have succeeded in  
spite of handicaps. Conditions in  
this regard are improving and will  
improve more in the future.

I would be glad if all taxpayers  
could investigate the county rec-  
ords. Fair examination of the rec-  
ords make the extravagant claims  
of self-serving office seekers look  
foolish. With great confidence I  
make the claim that if re-elected, my  
next administration will be yet more  
satisfactory to the taxpayers and  
myself than the one which is about  
to end.
