### OREGON WEEKLY INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

Springfield—Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company adds 200-name switchboard and audible ringing for all phones.

Glendale—Stelgard & Sons building sawmill at Anchor to cut 25,000 feet daily. This is the fifteenth mill to be built tributary to this place.

Albany—Construction to begin at once on state fish hatchery at Roaring river, to be one of the largest in the state.

Springfield—Concrete garage 66x120 feet, to be built at once.

Newport—Stock subscribed in 30 minutes for organizing a bank here.

Astoria—New Copeland building will be of concrete, three stories, to cost \$45,000.

Albany—Pacific Fruit Company will build cold storage and warehouse, 65x80 feet.

Klamath Falls—Woodcock Bros. will move their sawmill from Grants Pass to Langell on Strahorn railroad and employ 20 men.

Corvallis—Rural route No. 1 extended to serve Children's Home.

Klamath Falls—Construction begins April 1 on new grade school to cost \$125,000.

Astoria—Tidewater, Eastern & Western and Lewis & Malone Companies resume logging after holiday shutdown. Crown Willamette Company already at work.

Newport—New bank organized with \$20,000 capital and \$5,000 surplus to open March 1.

Tillamook—Creamery purchases county property for building creamery extension. November cheese sold for \$48,800. Price advances one cent. Machinery arrives for butter making at creamery plant.

Salem—Christian Scientists dedicate new \$75,000 church February 1st.

Medford—Construction to begin about February 15 on large new Ash cold storage plant.

Klamath Falls—Campbell - Towle Company, of Oshkosh, Wisconsin, buys approximately 50,000,000 feet Indian timber on Sprague river, and will build mill.

Astoria—State Highway Engineers will start survey for coast highway around face of Neahkanie mountain facing Pacific ocean; survey will require several months.
