Care Needed to Keep Plants in Good Health

Gardeners are occasionally asked to inspect unhealthy window plants and to advise concerning their treatment. Very often it is found that the ill health of the plant is due to mistaken kindness on the part of the owner. For instance, it is deluged with water day after day, with the result that the soil turns sour and the plant becomes moribund.

Another not infrequent cause of trouble may be traced to erratic watering; that is, daily attention for a time and then a period of forgetfulness, during which the unhappy plant receives no moisture, says Gardening Illustrated. A third cause is not uncommonly traceable to the fact that the plant is placed directly in a draft. It is not, as many suppose, the easiest matter in the world to keep window plants in good health, and it is only by patient attention and close observation that the cultivator learns the exact requirements—the likes and dislikes—of individual varieties. Careful watering, occasional weak doses of stimulant and, in the case of aspidistras and other fine-foliated plants, occasional spongings of the leaves, will go far toward success in the case of pot plants.

Dr. Parker, Hermiston Geologist

The accounts of the domestic troubles of the celebrated scientist, Dr. Herschel C. Parker in last Sunday's Oregonian brings back to mind the same man to a number of Hermiston people. Dr. Parker was here for two days two years ago and examined the Hermiston oil structure for the local oil company. He then made a very favorable report and in his interview Sunday he again stated that on the west slope of the Blue mountains was a veritable Teapot dome and some of the best anticlines in the world. His original report now held by the local company in his own writing states that the Hermiston structure is the best prospect between the Cascades and the Blue mountains, and that oil should be discovered at from 800 to 1200 feet. Dr. Parker is pronounced by Alaskan officials as the best geologist that ever came to Alaska. He is the discoverer of Helium gas which alone is sufficient for fame. Helium is non-explosive and is used in dirigibles. Hermiston was fortunate in securing him during a few days leisure in Portland, through some of the Portland stockholders of the local oil company.

regular feeding, careful attention to little details, seeing that the mash hoppers are never empty, that good grit, shell and charcoal are always available; that the green feed is fresh and clean, that none of the feed is ever stale or moldy; that clean water is always before them, that the litter is clean and never damp or musty, that the hens are never over fed or under fed and that sickness is never allowed to get a start in the flock.

Let one and all interested in the poultry game make every effort to make 1925 the most prosperous money making years yet. The next thing for us to do is to get organized into a marketing organization so that we may be better able to sell our eggs to advantage.

STREET IMPROVEMENT ASSESSMENT, HURLBURT AVENUE.

Notice is hereby given that in accordance with the provisions of Ordinance No. 114 and the Charter of the City of Hermiston, a proposed assessment has been made for the purpose of proportioning the cost of the improvement of that portion of Hurlburt Avenue lying between the east line of First street and the west line of Fourth street as described in said ordinance No. 114. The whole cost of improvement is the sum of \$1008.52 and the district to be assessed therefor is all the lots having a frontage upon said portion of Hurlburt Avenue above described.

Said proposed assessment has been apportioned and is on file in the office of the City Recorder and is subject to inspection. Any objection to such apportionment that may be made in writing to the City Council and filed with the Recorder within ten days from March 12th, 1925, will be heard and determined by the Council on April 1st, 1925, before the passage of any Ordinance assessing the cost of such improvement.

ORDINANCE No 118

An ordinance providing for the making of an improvement of that portion of Gladys Ave. lying between the east line of First street and the west line of Seventh street by grading and surfacing and constructing curbs and sidewalks on certain parts thereof and apportioning the cost of such improvement to the land specially benefited thereby, and for other purposes.

The City of Hermiston does ordain as follows:

Sec. 1. That that portion of Gladys Ave. in said city lying between the east line of First street and the west line of Seventh street be improved by grading and surfacing with crusher screenings and constructing curbs and sidewalks from First to Third street; by grading and surfacing with crusher screenings and constructing curbs on both sides and sidewalks on the north side from Third to Fourth street; by grading and surfacing with crusher screenings and constructing curbs from Fourth to Fifth street, by grading and surfacing a strip 16 feet wide in the center with crusher screenings from Fifth to Seventh street, according to the plans and specifications of such improvement heretofore made by the City Engineer and filed in the office of the City Recorder, at a probable cost of \$3204.00.

Sec. 2. That each lot, piece or parcel of land having a frontage upon that portion of Gladys Avenue so improved shall be assessed for the total cost and expense of the improvement just in front of and extending to the center of said street.

Sec. 3. That each of local improvement districts numbers 11 to 30, inclusive, heretofore created, shall be divided into four subdivisions of equal width and numbered 1, 2, 3 and 4 respectively, commencing at the cross section of said Gladys Avenue and one-fourth of the total cost and expense of improving each cross section included in Local Improvement District No. 10 heretofore created shall be assessed against each local improvement district abutting upon or adjacent thereto as follows: 40 per cent of the total cost and expense of said one-quarter of said cross section against sub-division No. 1 of said Local Improvement District, 25 per cent of said total cost and expense of said one-quarter of said cross section against sub-division No. 2 of said Local Improvement District, 20 per cent of said total cost and expense of said one-quarter of said cross section against sub-division No. 3 of said Local Improvement District, and 15 per cent of said total cost and expense of said one-quarter of said cross section against sub-division No. 4 of said Local Improvement District.

Sec. 4. That the City Recorder be, and he hereby is, instructed to give notice by publication for once a week for three consecutive weeks in the Hermiston Herald inviting proposals for making said improvement.

Sec. 5. That inasmuch as it is necessary that said improvement be made and finished before hot weather and it is necessary for the peace, safety and happiness of the inhabitants of the City that said improvement be made as soon as possible, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Council and approval by the Mayor.
