ALFALFA SEED RAISING SHOULD BE PROFITABLE

R. C. Canfield Thinks Some Lands of Project Particularly Adapted To This Crop

Hermiston Herald: So many have inquired about my experience in raising alfalfa seed on the Hermiston project, that I desire to say through your columns that with me seed raising is still in an experimental stage. I think I have settled upon a successful system of irrigation to produce seed, but some other problems are to be worked out. I have been very anxious to see a capable young man with capital to work out the details of seed raising on the third class lands of this project.

The market demands for Grimm alfalfa seed seems to be unfilling at a good price. Seed raising requires one-half the water required for a crop of hay. The labor of irrigating and harvesting is one-half that of producing hay; the value of one crop of seed ought to be fully as great as the value of three crops of hay.

If the third grade lands of this project can be put into successful production of seed it will bring a brighter day to our project.

I am still producing a little seed but have not been able to work out my original plans.

I believe seed raising and honey production can be worked together successfully.

Do you know that over 200,000 infants die each year in the United States?

Make a resolution that you will help to prevent one out of thirteen children from dying during its first year. Hygienic surroundings, diet, clothing and proper care when sick will prevent this.

The advice of the Dairy Committee should be well taken for if it is, it will add many thousands of dollars of additional income, with practically no additional expense, to the dairyman's receipts.

LOCAL MAN'S CASE STIRS UP PORTLAND COUNCIL

J. Skovbo's Lawyer Called Liar By Commissioner Bigelow

The following item is clipped from a recent issue of the Portland Telegram:

Charges that Marketmaster J. W. Eastman plays favorites on the public market and that Commissioner C. A. Bigelow has set about to prohibit any producer living east of the Cascades from selling on the market were made at this morning's council session by Arthur M. Geary, attorney for J. Skovbo, Hermiston, Oregon, honey producer, who was ousted from the market by Bigelow. Bigelow called Geary a liar. Commissioner Barbur averred that Skovbo would have done better with an attorney.

The council by a vote of 3 to 1 sustained Bigelow. Mayor Baker voted against the motion.

Geary charged that Eastman owns bees which he leases to a producer who sells honey on the public market. He said that Bigelow had never allowed any Eastern Oregon producer since Skovbo came to sell on the market, and that Eastman and Bigelow had waited until they caught Skovbo in a technical violation of the ordinance to freeze him out.

Skovbo was thrown off the market because he bought 100 lbs. of bees from another producer who went out of the business. The bees contained, according to Skovbo, about 300 or 400 pounds of honey, which
