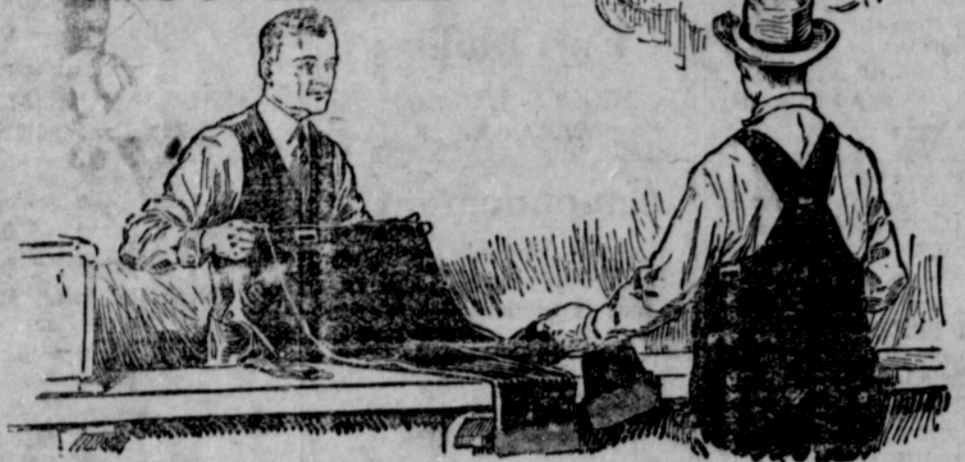

READ THE LAW. DON'T GUESS
"It is amusing and amazing how men will criticize and condemn something that does no text, says the state market agent. "Our office has been kept busy the past two weeks answering complaints and questions about the new potato law, there was no question or grounds for complaint. Those criticizing simply had not read the law and did not know what they were complaining about."

"Last week a representative of potato growers of eastern Clackamas county came to the office and protested against the unfairness of the new law, which he said permitted Yakima to dump its ungraded stock onto Oregon while home growers were compelled to grade, stencil and have their stock inspected. A copy of the law was read to him and he was asked to point out the discriminating section. He couldn't find it. The law compels Washington, Idaho or any other state to do all that Oregon has to do if their potatoes are sold or offered for sale in this state. These protesters had not even read the law when they assembled and protested against it."

"There is nothing in the new law that any honest grower or dealer can object to, that I can see," says Mr. Spence. "It simply compels the grower or shipper to state the kind of stock that is in the sack he is selling. It is protection to the man who is putting up an honest pack; it is protection to the family that is buying the stock, and when the growers get familiar with the grades they will find that they can save their culms for stock feed and yet get as much for the graded stuff as they would have gotten for the whole crop."
