Children's Sight

Children with normal eyesight or with moderate defects see better as they grow older. Sneller's eye test, given to 9,245 children, showed that the percentage of children with normal vision increased as the children grew older and the percentages of those with minor defects decreased. The number of children with markedly defective vision increased, however, with age.

Of all the children tested 63 per cent were found to be normal, 27 per cent moderately defective and only 10 per cent had poor sight. The percentage of boys with normal sight was slightly higher than the girls, but the average for those with very poor vision was the same.
