By virtue of an execution, judgment, order and decree of sale issued out of the above entitled Court, in the above entitled cause, to me directed and dated the 10th day of November, 1925, upon a judgment rendered and entered in the said court on the 1st day of October 1925, in favor of Eastern Oregon Livestock Company a corporation, plaintiff, and against J. W. Reese and Alida M. Reese, his wife, August J. Stange and Priscilla A.
