Famous English Library

The Bodleian library is the public library of the University of Oxford, England. Its name derives from Sir Thomas Bodley, who restored it in 1568. Among other things he gave to the library a large and valuable collection of books purchased on the continent. The library occupies the site of the old University library, which was despoiled of its contents during the reign of Edward VI. By copyright law, a copy of every volume published in the United Kingdom is given the library, which has from time to time been enriched by valuable collections of books and manuscripts. In the matter of rare books and manuscripts it is second only to the library of the Vatican, at Rome.—Kansas City Times.

Dental Hygiene

Among the occupations which have arisen in connection with the development of preventive medicine and public health work, that of the dental hygienist, oral hygienist, or dental nurse, as it has been variously called, is perhaps the most recent. Dental disease is the most common of all human ailments, and seems likely to remain so for some time to come. The public school offers an especially fine field of work for both prophylactic and educational work, and the dental hygienist is employed by the Department of Education in a considerable number of cities, towns and rural districts. Dental hygienists are well paid, considering the time spent in training. The salaries range from \$80 to \$200 a month.

Sugar From Linen

There is now in Germany a manufactory which turns out daily 1,000 pounds of pure white sugar made from old linen. An understanding of the process helps somewhat to dispel the unpleasant feeling we experience on hearing of the fact. Clean old linen is vegetable fibrin, and when treated with sulphuric acid, it is converted into dextrin. This is washed with lime water, then treated with more acid, and it changes almost immediately, and crystallizes into glucose or grape-sugar, which is so highly valued in the making of rich preserves and jellies. The process is said to be economical, and the sugar is found to be chemically the same as the grape.
