

POULTRY HOUSE IDEAS

The poor lumber dealer got an awful wallop not long ago. And this is the way it happened. Chicken houses were being built at least twelve high with a wonderful arrangement of sash and ventilators way up there so high that they might have served as "lookouts" in the time of invasion.

Since chickens are not built on the same plan as giraffes, folks began to realize that all that superstructure was unnecessary. Now they build their poultry houses not more than eight feet high at the highest place. They have found that the chickens can keep warmer and with a simple ventilating arrangement they do much better.

business in the spring of 1925 with 500 Petaluma chicks at a cost of \$65.

Brooders, house and brooder and other equipment cost him \$60.

and \$3.75, feed to January 1, was \$229.95, laying stock \$150 or a total invested during the year of \$519.20.

He sold 130 cockerels at 20 cents or \$26, consumed 105 cockerels at \$21, sold four dozen of eggs in September for \$1.30; 61 1/2 dozen in October for \$21.52; 201 dozen in November for \$87.50 and 321 2-3 dozen in December for \$112.18 or a total return from the young flock of \$268.70. In addition he has 225 pullets all of good type, besides his equipment—a good start for a small investment. He bought the pullets April 25, 1925 and before the year is up his investment will be clear or nearly so, from the profits of the year.
