Hermiston high school had three men to qualify for the county meet. Jack Smith took first in the javelin throw and second in the shot put. John Pace got a third in the 50 yard dash and Ernest Parrish was second in the mile.

Representatives from Hermiston's grade school who qualified for the county meet were Maxine Avery, 50 yard dash; Jack Lee, 25 yard dash; Donald DeMoss, high jump; and Cox 100 yard dash.

Finest of All Oils

Watchmakers' oil, the finest of its kind in the world, is obtained from the jaws of the porpoise by the Passamaquoddy Indians, who live on the coast of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Maine. The jaws are hung up in the sun, and the oil as it drips from them is caught in cans, placed below. Only about half a pint comes from each jaw. The oil commands high prices, and in late years it has become so expensive that its use in the delicate machinery of lighthouses has been abandoned.

To Test Pearls

In Paris not long ago a group of the world's greatest pearl merchants watched a French scientist pour gently a handful of pearls into a tube containing what appeared to be water. Some sank to the bottom, but others floated.
"Gentlemen," the scientist said "you will find that the pearls heavy enough to float in this fluid are natural pearls. Those that sank are cultured Japanese pearls," says Popular Science Monthly.

Historic Bells
An odd wooden cage for the heavy peal of ancient bells belonging to the church of East Bergholt, near Ipswich, England, has often been noticed. This elaborate oaken cage stands in the churchyard. It was built originally in the early years of the Seventeenth century, and has been restored recently. The reason for its construction was that the projected and half-completed church tower was never finished. There is a similar, but not quite so large, timber bell-cage in the churchyard of Wramness, between Colchester and Harwich.
Throughout the ages bells have been the heralds of tidings, cheerful and sad, of news good and ill.

Pigeons Long Popular

For thousands of years pigeons have been favorite birds with the people of many countries and in many climes, and the popularity is as great today, or greater, as in any other period of which history speaks. Hannes III, loved pigeons, donated some of the finest for use in the temple of Thebes, and Pliny told in his writings of birds selling for sums that would be about \$75 in money of today. He thought that price rather high, but pigeons have sold in this country within the last year for \$1,200. Pigeon racing is the popular sport of Belgium.—Ohio State Journal.

Compass at the Poles

The department of research in terrestrial magnetism of the Carnegie Institution of Washington says that in the absence of any observational data at the true North pole it is not possible to state to what movement, or change in direction, a compass needle at that point is subject. The north end of the compass needle at the true North pole would point approximately toward the North Magnetic pole, which is situated about latitude 70 degrees 5 minutes north and longitude 96 degrees west of Greenwich.
