MUSEUM IS ESTABLISHED WHERE CZAR WAS SLAIN

Bloodstained Room Where Royal Family Was Murdered Preserved by Soviet Government.

Sverdlovsk, Siberia.—The Bolshevik government has converted the house in which the emperor and empress of Russia and their family were murdered into an historical museum. Part of the building now is a small Communist "university." The former dining room of the imperial family has become a reading room, where scores of proletarian students pore over newspapers and scientific books.

In the basement is the blood-stained bullet-pierced room in which the royal family were killed. It has been preserved as an "historical reminder of the just fate that befell the autocrat of all the Russias."

A section of the floor is torn up, the Kolchak troops having, it is said, attempted to remove traces of the crime. Visitors are told that after the Kolchak officers discovered the murder, white soldiers washed the floor and distributed the suds to the clergy, "priests having waited for hours in long lines for their share of the water containing their former imperial master's blood."

Visitors must have special permission. Some Americans recently were refused entrance on the ground that foreign visitors had written matter hostile to the Bolshevik regime. Outside the house, which overlooks the "Square of National Vengeance," is a marble pedestal on which stands a headless statue of Karl Marx. The statue was "beheaded" by Kolchak's troops in 1918.

Build Grain Elevator for Dust-Blast Tests

Philadelphia.—A miniature elevator designed to be blown up has been built by the bureau of chemistry, Department of Agriculture, to demonstrate the explosive force of dusts formed in grain elevators, starch factories and all sorts of plants where dusts are formed. This little elevator is made of galvanized iron, is shaped like a big elevator, and is but a little larger than an ordinary suitcase. Inside, where one might expect to find bins, conveyor belts and grain spouts, there is nothing but an electric arrangement for producing a spark at the touch of a button by the operator. In the roof is a large opening, over which a piece of paper is stretched and held tightly by a clamp.

In demonstrating the explosiveness of the various kinds of dusts when ignited, the operator measures out a tablespoonful of any dust that will burn (but it should be fine and dry), puts it in the bottom of the elevator, and blows it into suspension by means of compressed air. At the same time he presses the button which produces the electric spark. Instantly the dust-air mixture ignites, the paper roof bursts with a loud report and a flash of flame.

Potato Test Started

A test of lots of seed potatoes to secure data on relative yields and freedom from disease will be conducted this summer on the experiment station farm by Superintendent Dean in co-operation with the county agent. Dry land Weston mountain seed and some lots from Yakima will be utilized in the tests.
