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BUILDING

Farmers in the Hermiston district have planted sufficient asparagus seed this spring to insure enough young plants to set an additional 60 acres to the cash crop in the spring of 1927.

About 40,000 baby chicks were either hatched here or purchased from outside hatcheries and shipped onto the project this spring.

Dairying is being done on a large scale by many farmers, and dairy stock is to be found on practically all farms.

Experimental work is being done in an effort to secure even greater carrying capacity on our pastures.

The early potato crop promises to amount to between 20 and 25 carloads in volume, the heaviest production of early tubers in the history of the project.

The above facts have a deep significance. We who live here have realized that expansion of several lines of farming was going on, but in the rush of doing our daily work, the real meaning of these changes can readily be missed.

What is happening on the Umatilla project is that the scheme of farming is undergoing a decided change. Alfalfa, once the only crop of any great importance grown here, is having to share with other crops a place on our farms. We may expect always to have a large part of land devoted to alfalfa growing, but alfalfa as a cash crop has undoubtedly lost its hold on the project.

We are gradually taking on specialties which are especially adapted to our soil, climate and the temper of our producers. It won't be very long now until asparagus will move from Hermiston in carlots. Potatoes will go in carlots this summer, within a short time. Cream and dairy products are now being in checks every day. Receipts from eggs are adding to the gross volume of business on many farms with prospects that the production in this line has not even begun to get started.

The project will be made by the skill, industry and persistence of farmers. They are measuring up to the job that is cut out for them. The fact that the whole scheme of farming is slowly being changed, in accordance with the capacity of the country to produce economically what can be sold for a profit, offers more cause for a feeling of optimism as to the future of the project than all other factors.

The foundation of the system has already been laid. It is being added to slowly, painstakingly, intelligently. The results in some measure are already apparent. They will become increasingly evident next year, the year after that, and for many years to come.

Potato growers of Oregon find it beneficial to eye-index the tubers, says M. B. McKay, plant pathologist of the experiment station. They take one eye from each tuber, and grow it in a green house during the winter, in order to obtain an index of the health of the potato from which it came. Only potatoes making a good showing are planted. The index method is an efficient way of eliminating potato virus disease.
