R. Alexander Sells

R. Alexander, pioneer merchant of Pendleton, has disposed of his store at Pendleton to two Goldendale, Washington, men, and will retire from business after almost half a century of active merchandising. He is vice-president of the First National bank at Hermiston.

M. B. McKay, plant pathologist at the Oregon experiment station, is working, as other men in the country, on methods for controlling potato diseases. As soon as a new disease develops he finds some method of control, which the farmers may use to combat it. Thus it is the constant efforts of the scientists that keep the tables supplied with the common potato.

If cultivation of young trees is stopped in July in Oregon, growth is slowed down and the tissues are properly hardened for the winter says the college extension service. Rank growth is common among the more healthy of newly planted trees, but if the tissues do not harden a slight freeze during the winter kills them.

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
