**CONSIDER THE ONION**

Reports of a yield of a little more than 300 bags of onions to an acre on the S. L. Carson ranch northwest of Hermiston this summer entitle the bulbs to serious consideration as a cash crop to be grown on the project.

Experience may prove that some of the soil here is not adapted to the culture of onions, but there are several hundred acres of silt dirt which will produce them successfully, if the experience of the Carsons and other farmers and truck gardeners mean anything. On the Carson place several crops have been grown, and the same sort of soil prevails in much of the so called bottom land.

The culture of onions is not a white collar job by any stretch of the imagination. It is hard, tedious exacting work. But the crop pays well over a period of years. A yield of 250 sacks to the acre is fairly good, and in some onion districts yields often go much above this. The prices secured show quite a range over a period of years, much the same as in the case of potatoes. That means that there will be lean years, fat years and "in between" years. But onion growing offers some high stakes to shoot for. For men farming small acreages, or in families, where there is a liberal supply of labor, onion growing offers a good opportunity as a cash crop.

The old idea in growing the crop was that every operation connected with the cultivation and harvesting should be done by hand. That idea, however, has been punctured. California knocked it into a cocked hat several years ago, and of late in certain sections of Idaho growers who have gone into the business on a gambling scale have evolved machines, many of them home made, which have reduced labor costs materially.

The onions that are seeded in the fall and harvested next mid-summer usually strike a good market, though that is not always true. The same marketing machinery that is being used to sell asparagus and early potatoes exists to serve the growers of onions.

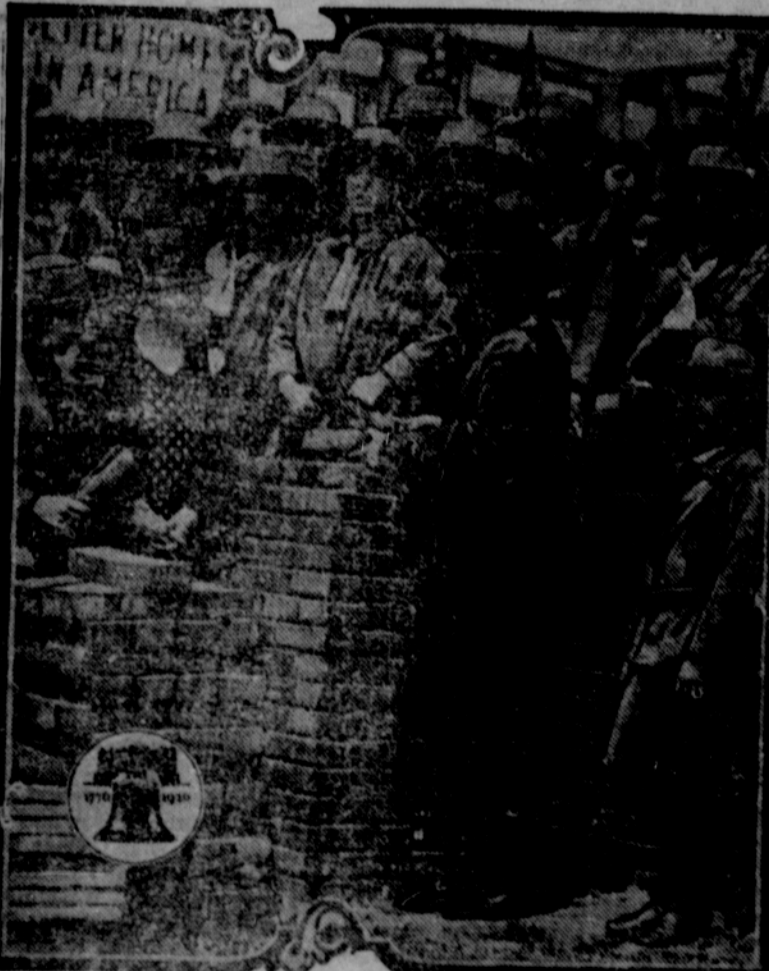
For those who take kindly to hand and knife weeding and who can grin when the bulbs are worth only 75 cents a sack, as well as rejoice when they are worth three or four dollars, onions are a good gamble.
