HAY STACKS AND WEEDS

STUDY OF LOCAL LANDS

WILL BE MADE TOMORROW

Field Man of Portland Chamber of Commerce to See Lands with Pendleton Men.

A visit to Hermiston and over lands that will receive water from McKay reservoir will be made tomorrow by representatives of the Portland Chamber of Commerce and some Pendleton men.

C. C. Gignoux, assistant agricultural specialist of the Union Pacific System, and Arthur Foster, field man of the land settlement department

of the Portland chamber, will come from Portland. They will be accompanied by Geo. C. Baer, secretary of the Pendleton Commercial association, and Fred Bennion, county agent.

The visit at this time will be made chiefly for the purpose of giving Mr. Foster an opportunity to see and examine the lands before he goes back to the middle west on a field trip to visit personally farmers there who have indicated an interest in Oregon as a prospective settling place. W. G. Ide, manager of the land settlement department, will be here early in August to continue his study of the land here. After his visit it is expected that a definite plan of procedure for settlement work as it affects this district will be adopted and followed.
