### First Settlement in Oregon Was Astoria

The first permanent settlement in Oregon was founded at Astoria by agents of the Pacific Fur company, who arrived at the mouth of the Columbia river 115 years ago. The fur company was backed by John Jacob Astor, but the men engaged by him to invade the northwestern wilderness were Canadians, a majority being of Scotch descent.

The party left Montreal in a big canoe and made their way down the St. Lawrence, thence to the Hudson and New York, from which port they sailed on the ship Tonquin, which doubled Cape Horn and proceeded to Hawaii, sailing thence for the Columbia river. Arrived at the mouth of that mighty stream, they built a fort, calling it Astoria, which gradually developed into the town and city of that name.

### OVERDUE FARM LOANS ALMOST LIQUIDATED

Spokane, Wash. — Liquidation of farm loans overdue has been almost wholly accomplished and the farmer is facing better times, according to Charles E. Lobdell of Washington, D. C., fiscal agent for the federal land bank system, who was here with officers of most of the 12 land banks of the country. Lobdell said the liquidation was drastic and caused suffering, but could not be avoided. He pointed out, however, that while the land banks have loaned \$1,250,000,000 since their organization, they have had to take over only \$10,000,000 worth of land on account of delinquency in loan payments. This is less than 1 per cent. Much of this has been sold, and the banks now have between six and seven million dollars' worth.

The land banks' 5 1/2 per cent rate to farmers has caused the lowering of rates by private concerns to 6 per cent or less, whereas the going interest was 8 and in some regions 10 per cent before the land banks began operating, according to Lobdell. Thus farmers are saved many millions yearly in interest charges.

### BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

Queen Marie of Roumania will sail for the United States early in October.

Premier Meighen of Canada, whose party failed to obtain a majority in the general elections, announced that he and members of his cabinet would resign.

Flood waters of swollen rivers in five Kansas counties did damage to highways, cities, railroads, crops and livestock which will total \$4,000,000, it was estimated.

Ashby Snow, prominent in Utah's mining and other interests and a descendant of two of the state's pioneer families, was nominated by the Utah democratic convention as candidate for the United States senate. He will oppose Reed Smoot at the November general elections.

George Ward Holdrege, who as general manager of its western lines for more than a third of a century was responsible for building most of the Burlington's trackage in Nebraska, Wyoming, Colorado, South Dakota and Montana, died in Omaha. He was in his 79th year.

### Pythian Children's Home is Dedicated.

Vancouver, Wash.—With Mrs. Helen Wrightman, Silverton, grand chief of the domain of Oregon, Pythian Sisters, and Mrs. Mayme Gleason, Tacoma, grand chief for Washington, in charge, the children's unit of the Oregon-Washington Pythian home here was dedicated. The unit, recently completed, cost \$36,000 and will accommodate 40 children.

### Words Are Jefferson's

It was Thomas Jefferson, and not Washington, who in his first inaugural address spoke of "peace, commerce and honest friendship with all nations, entangling alliances with none." In Washington's farewell address, he said: "It is our true policy to steer clear of permanent alliances with any portion of the foreign world." It will be noticed that Washington spoke of "permanent alliance." In a speech to congress Washington said: "To be prepared for war is one of the most effectual means of preserving peace." This is frequently misquoted by omitting the words "one of."

### Sudden Jungle Quiet as Night Approaches

There is some noise in the jungle all day long, according to African travelers, but just at nightfall it becomes oppressively quiet. Not a sound is to be heard for a while, but this does not last long, for all of a sudden there are many noises to be heard that were not experienced during the day.

Jackals begin to yelp and hyenas to howl, immediately followed by hundreds of other lesser denizens of the jungle. These noises keep up all night, approaching at times and then receding, so that the camper is kept at qui vive all the time, not knowing when some animal will poke its nose into his presence.
