#### Wild Holds Its Own

The persistence of the wild life close to the haunts of man and his works is more than remarkable. When man first intruded into the wilderness places wild animals were his easy prey. They did not know anything about him and probably looked upon him only as some fellow animal who had come to share their lot. They were disillusioned fast enough and they learned quick lessons from disillusionment.

Today wild animals know how to care for themselves. For years their ranks rapidly decreased, but when man believed that the vanishing point almost had been reached there were seen signs of increase. All the animals had become "foxy."

#### Little Pure Hebrew

The Jews who left Germany during the Middle ages for the Slavic lands of Bohemia, Poland, Galicia and Lithuania spoke Middle High German and wrote it quite correctly, although they employed the Hebrew letters. Out of touch with Germany, the German sounds and forms underwent some change, while Hebrew, Aramaic and Slavic words were added to the language. The resultant Idiom, Yiddish, supplanted the Slavic of the primitive Jewish settlers, and gradually with Jewish migration was carried to all parts of the world. Pure Hebrew is now an academic language, found only in books.

#### Ape Descended From Man,

**Says German Savant**  
Berlin.—The ape is descended from man and not man from the ape, according to Prof. Max Westenhofer, custodian of the Pathological museum of the Berlin university. He points out that chimpanzee cubs resemble human beings much more than do their parents. He says that certain inner organs give evidence that man's ancestors lived for a time in water. These peculiar characteristics are missing in apes, which, he declares, "shows that the ape represents the subsequent development and proves that man is the older form of mammal." Professor Westenhofer elucidated this theory before the anthropological congress now in session at Salzburg.

Philadelphia.—Women are likely to be bald because of bobs, in the opinion of one hairdresser at a convention. He says bobs have led to the fad of tight hats, which cause the hair to fall out.

#### Chicks Grow Faster

**by Ultra-Violet Rays**  
Newport, Eng.—Young chicks have been made to grow twice as fast by use of electricity, says Prof. Borlases Matthews, a poultry expert. The young birds were treated for nine weeks with ultra-violet rays.

Professor Matthews advises poultry farmers either to give chickens electrically made ozone as provided in London underground railways or to bathe them with electricity radiated from electric wires over their perches at night. He contends the yield in eggs would be increased nearly 50 per cent.

#### This Family Is Tiny

**League of Nations**  
London.—Six destitute orphans, each of a different nationality, were recently adopted by a wealthy English merchant and his wife, who were childless. They decided to rear them as their own, and their family is now a little "league of nations." The nationalities of the boys are as follows: Johnnie, English; Pierre, French; Camillo, Italian; Carlos, Spanish; Ignace, Polish; and Jan, Swedish. The youngest of the boys is only six months old and the eldest six years. All boys have been naturalized and are now British subjects. The family is said to be wonderfully happy and the foster father believes this experiment of a "league of nations" will be a great success.
