SPREADING WAR'S COST

One of the most significant declarations since the war was made on armistice day by President Coolidge when he advocated universal conscription of both men and all wealth as a defense measure in time of war.

The enactment into law of such an idea and its enforcement in time of national conflict should bear two major results: It should eliminate immense profit for capital and automatically force all capital to seek peace, a condition of affairs that has never prevailed in the past; it should give the United States such a tremendous advantage as to make it practically invulnerable to attack by aggressors, providing always that our armed forces are sufficient in training and numbers to withstand shock long enough for reserves to get into action.

The old idea that has prevailed whereby men could be conscripted and their lives placed in jeopardy for meager wages while wealth was left practically free to dictate its own earnings at public expense is unbearably unfair. Wealth is not so precious as life and should be drafted at the first bugle call.

The idea of universal conscription of men and wealth for purposes of defense in war has been advocated for several years by the American Legion. The forces of wealth undoubtedly will try all means to defeat such legislation, but the idea is so fundamentally right that it is bound to be put into effect. Then there will be a lack of men and institutions desiring a war as a means to making themselves a profit. Modern warfare has been divested of glamor and glory. The elimination of profit will be a big step in making warfare about 100 per cent unpopular.

REPORT OF COUNTY HEALTH NURSE MADE FOR OCTOBER

Following is the report of work done in the office of the county health nurse during October:

Patients during month, 21. Patients dismissed, seven. Patients carried forward, 14. Of the seven dismissed one was admitted to tuberculosis hospital at Salem, two to hospital care and four to family or other care. Investigation visits, 19. Instructional visits, nine. Nursing care, four. Miscellaneous and other visits during the month, 125. Visits to the office, 88. Letters written in interest of the work, 70. Number of phone calls, 126 Miles traveled, 1209. Number of schools visited, 28. Three hundred and nineteen pupils were measured and weighed; of this number there were 67 that were seven per cent or more underweight and seven that were 20 per cent or more overweight. Eighty-two corrections had been made prior to the school visit. This included corrected teeth and vision, removal of tonsils and adenoids. The percentage of correction is high and the percentage of underweight very low when compared with figures found a few years ago. It is an interesting fact that almost every child weighed knew his weight and whether he was within the range of normal weight, and also the suspected defects he was supposed to have.
