RUM PRESCRIPTION LIMITATION UPHeld

Washington, D. C.—Volstead act restrictions upon the quantity of whisky physicians may prescribe to patients each 10 days were sustained by the supreme court.

The decision was a sharply divided court, four members, Justices Sutherland, McReynolds, Stone and Butler dissenting. The dissenting opinion was that the state had exclusive jurisdiction to regulate the use of intoxicating liquor for other than beverage purposes, and that congress had not prohibited the use of liquor for medicinal purposes and that it did not have the authority to do so.

The decision, which was rendered in a case brought by Dr. Samuel W. Lambert of New York, marked another victory for the government which has been sustained by the court almost without exception in its program for dry law enforcement.

The supreme court refused to pass upon the question whether the state of Washington could enforce a ban dry law prohibiting the possession of intoxicating liquor in view of the federal law permitting the possession of such liquor acquired before the Volstead act took effect.

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

The Norwegian parliament is considering a bill to tax all foreign publications entering the country.

Engineering students to the number of 56,332 matriculated during the first term, 1925-26, in 143 institutions in the United States, according to statistics compiled by the interior department, bureau of education.

Eighty persons were known to be dead from the violence of tornadoes which struck in six southern and southwestern states. Arkansas paid the gravest penalty with 46 killed by the winds in 12 or more widely separated communities.

An outline of decision of Roman Catholic tribunal, annulling the marriage of Consuelo Vanderbilt and Duke of Marlborough, made public in Rome, confirms previous reports that annulment was granted on grounds that Miss Vanderbilt was forced to marry the duke by her mother, now Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont.

McGee Jurors Fail to Agree.

Tillamook, Or.—After deliberating for more than 48 hours on the mass of testimony piled up in the trial of Mrs. Eva N. McGee, charged with the murder of her husband, Dr. W. G. McGee, August 17, by the administration of strychnine poison, the jury was unable to agree and was dismissed. It is understood that ballots were taken almost every hour in the jury room and that early in the deliberations the 11 men and one woman stood eight for conviction and four for acquittal.

John Browning, Noted Inventor, Dies.

Brussels.—John M. Browning, noted firearms inventor, died at Herstals, near Liege. Browning, who was the inventor of the Browning machine gun, was a consultant of the Fabrique Nationale factory since 1897 and it was while on a visit to it that he died of heart failure.

Boise Man Heads All U. S. Prisons.

Washington, D. C.—Albert Holmes Conner, Boise, Idaho, was named superintendent of all federal prisons by Attorney General Skagert. Conner succeeds the late Luther B. White. He was attorney general for Idaho for the term of 1923-26.

N. P. to Spend Big Sum in Montana. St. Paul, Minn.—A \$4,000,000 expansion program in Montana was announced by Charles Donnelly, president of the Northern Pacific railway.

The Rainier Fish company shipped two carloads of the fall catch of salmon to New York Sunday and another carload was shipped to Boston Wednesday. The gillnetters, trappers and seiners report heavy catches.

Mining excitement is running high in Wallawa county following the discovery of a vein containing gold, silver and copper on Lick creek, near Enterprise, which rough assays indicate will run \$100 to the ton.

LUMBER RATES ARE UPHeld BY EXAMINER

Washington, D. C.—Producers of lumber along Puget sound in Washington state are not being unreasonably treated by railroads in rates to Idaho and Utah points located on the Oregon Short Line, Interstate Commerce Commission Examiner Disque has reported.

The lumber industries located around Seattle and Tacoma instituted the proceedings by complaining that Portland, Ore., and group points had better rates to the territories described. Portland interests resisted the claim.

The examiner held that present rates from all points concerned are fair, and advised the commission, which will consider the matter further, to dismiss the complaint of the Washington producers.

WOULD STOP BANK RUNS

Nineteen Banks in Two Counties of Iowa Close.

Des Moines, Ia.—Business men and farmers of Palo Alto and Kosuth counties joined forces with officers and employees of 19 banks in a canvass of depositors, designed to bring forth enough time waivers on deposits to permit the institutions to reorganize and resume business.

The banks were closed by agreement in an effort to halt what was termed unwarranted withdrawal of funds that threatened disaster.

The closed banks include state, national and private institutions.

No official estimate of the amount of money on deposit in the closed institutions was available, but unofficial estimates place the amount in the millions.

Oregon Bank Dept. Returned to Salem

Salem, Or.—G. F. Skipworth, judge of the Lane county circuit court, handed down a decision in which he ordered the transfer of the state banking department from its present headquarters in Portland to Salem.

Canadian Ervey to U. S. Approved.

London.—King George has approved the appointment of the Hon. Charles V. Massey of Toronto as Canadian minister at Washington.
