BREAK NARROWLY AVERTED IN FEED CANAL NEAR ECHO

Water Turned Out and Repairs Made Sunday; Bank About Ready To Break.

A break in the feed canal to Cold Springs reservoir that probably would have been serious was prevented Sunday when the water was turned out of the canal. A slow seep age leak in the rock above Echo which has existed for five or six years gave signs of becoming serious, and when an examination was made after the water was turned out indications were that another 24 hours would have resulted in a break.

The fill was made Sunday, and with a return of warmer weather when the danger of ice jams is less than now the water will be turned back into the canal.

FOUR GEESSE AGGED BY J. H. REID THIS MORNING

A tip by telephone from his neighbors that wild geese were feeding in one of his fields, the use of a horse to stalk the wary game birds and a good eye yielded J. H. Reid, Columbia district farmer, four birds early this morning.

Mr. Reid got behind his horse and led it toward the geese and was able to approach within gunshot. Out of his Christmas present he divided with the neighbors that gave him the tip.

Embry Trades Farm. J. T. Embry, pioneer resident of the project, has traded his 26 acre place north of Hermiston for a house

and an acre of land at La Grande. He and Mrs. Embry have not definitely decided yet as to what they will do, but they expect to go to Clarkston, Washington, soon for a visit with their son.

Irish Surnames Rank With World's Oldest

It will be news to many people that Irish surnames are the oldest in Europe except the Venetian, and more over not a single one of the great Irish family names is taken from any trade or occupation—every one is derived from some noted ancestor, usually a prince or military commander. Things are far different in England. Thus Howard, the family name of the dukes of Norfolk, is derived from Hog-ward, or guardian of pigs. English surnames, moreover, are extremely recent. There is, for example, not a single English surname that goes back beyond the Eleventh century, and the oldest surnames are not English but Norman-French. On the other hand, in Ireland there is not a single surname in Ua or O which does not go back to the Eleventh century or beyond it. Surnames in Mac are more recent. O or Ua means "grandson"; Ni means "grand-daughter"; Mac means "son."

I believe there is not a single Irish name that has not been changed in its translation from Gaelic into English—the English form usually represents the pronunciation of the historic Irish form. In Leinster, however, where the English first established a footing, the assumption of English in place of Irish names was compelled by law, translation being the process usually adopted.—From a letter in New York Times.

America Leads Nations In Use Of Ice Cream

If any one food may be considered as America's national dish, it is ice cream.

Ice cream is a food particularly adapted to the needs of individuals of all ages, giving as it does the best type of nutrients for the repair of bone, teeth, blood and muscles and for energy.

Today thousands of housewives make their own ice cream. As a consequence, the making of this highly nutritious food at a reduced cost, yet without in any way impairing the product, is of importance.

Home economists have found a means to this end in the use of evaporated milk. There are three important reasons why evaporated milk



makes the best ice cream, they point out. Because 60 per cent of the natural water in evaporated milk has been removed by evaporation, there is over twice the percentage of solids present in this type of milk than there is in ordinary market milk—and, since it is the solids that give ice cream its pleasing flavor, this fact is of moment.

Then, the composition of evaporated milk is constant, for the reason that it has been put through an homogenizing process, which breaks up the fat globules into tiny particles and distributes them evenly throughout the milk. This attribute makes for an ice-cream mixture of uniform quality and fine texture.

Finally, experts agree that the use of evaporated milk in ice cream contributes to its hygienic qualities, for the reason that evaporated milk is entirely sterile. Health authorities declare that milk and cream should be treated to a heat of 150 degrees F. for half an hour in order that a product may be produced free from infective organisms. Evaporated milk is processed at 240 degrees for 30 minutes, and, therefore, its introduction into an ice-cream mixture increases its purity in proportion to the amount of evaporated milk used.

Island's "Soup" Harvest

There is an island off the coast of China that has but one industry. It is soup. To those not inflated, birds' nest soup may easily summon up a picture of stewed twigs, string, grass, bits of cotton and feathers; but connoisseurs of the exotic know that the nests from which this brand of soup is made are composed entirely of a gelatinous substance excreted by the birds as they build. On this island, where an intensive soup industry is conducted (it is sometimes called Birds' Nest Island, sometimes the Island of a Hundred Peaks), there are caves in which the birds construct their dwellings in great numbers. These are regularly harvested after each breeding season and the delicacy is prepared for export.

Lonsdale Romance

There is a romantic story, remembered perhaps by very few, connected with the wonderful dinner set of Sevres china at Lowerter castle. It had been stolen in Paris during the revolution, and subsequently purchased by the second earl of Lonsdale. There were three pieces wanting, and for these the earl searched for many years without success. At last—his age was eighty—he heard that they were catalogued in a sale in London. He sent a friend to purchase them, and, being very feeble, waited outside in his brougham. The missing pieces were purchased, Lord Lonsdale took them home—and died that night.
