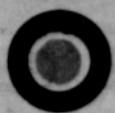

class strawberries and weeds or cheat won't all grow on the same ground."

He has found that plants should be set out very early in the spring, either February or early March, or else just after water is turned on. It is a good plan to have the plants well rooted and established before spring winds, or hot sunshine that some times prevails early in the spring, he said.

As to the reward the strawberry grower may expect if he gives his beds a chance, Mr. Dyer said that a half acre patch with good care should yield between 250 and 300 crates as an average. Prices vary, but the seasonal average should make the patch good for several hundred dollars gross income. Care in handling and marketing are the big variable factors that must be taken into consideration in trying to estimate income, according to his experience.

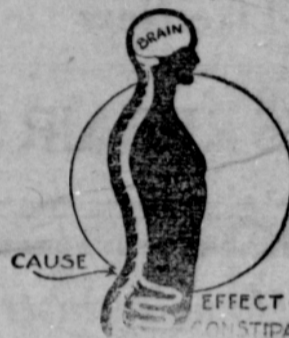
