The poultry census is taken only every 10 years. The last census showed there were in the United States 360,000,000 chickens. They produced 1,679,000,000 dozen eggs. The year's production of chickens and eggs brought \$1,048,000,000.

Ninety per cent of this billion dollars goes to farmers or rather to farmers' wives. These good wives spend it for groceries, clothing, lights, washing machines, rugs, pictures, books, phonographs. If we should take the poultry money out of a farm community, the country town merchants would wonder what had happened to their business.

Higher labor and feed prices, our newer knowledge of the factors making for economical and successful egg production, and an increasing demand for a standardized product on the part of the consumer are factors which are forcing many farm folks to make adjustments in their flocks. Farm poultry is fast getting down to a more business-like basis.

MALLARD EGGS FURNISHED BY PENDLETON MAN INCUBATED IN PLANT OF WHITE'S HATCHERY

Not content with hatching chickens, the White hatchery has extended the scope of its operations to duck eggs, and the ducks that will be hatched from a tray of eggs that went into one incubator Tuesday night will be mallards. The eggs were furnished by Elmer McCormach of near Pendleton and came from stock which he uses as live decoy stock during duck hunting season.

The first trays of turkey eggs for the season also were placed in incubators at the hatchery this week. Several thousand turkey eggs have been contracted for hatching at the local plant.

COMMUNITY CLUB TO TAKE ACTION ON OPENING FUND Building Fund May be Used in Part To Help on Tennis Court, Is Plan.

Whether action taken by the Community club in 1923 to save 90 per cent of its earnings for a building fund shall be rescinded is to be decided at the next meeting April 5, according to a motion adopted at the special meeting held Monday afternoon in the library.

The club recently voted to use \$200 of its sinking fund to help the high school construct a tennis court, providing the money is available for such a use. The next regular meeting will be for the purpose of securing an expression of opinion as to what the club wishes to do relative to rescinding the original action in 1923 when the building fund was started.
