labor. The speaker cited the record of two other farms, one with a small herd of cows on which the labor income was \$10 per acre, and another hay farm on which the labor income was only eight dollars per acre.

The outlook for dairying is excellent, according to the opinion expressed by Ivan H. Loughary, northwest representative of the American Jersey Cattle club. Butter in storage now is only one third the volume that was in storage a year ago, he said, and dairy cattle have not been increasing in numbers recently in proportion to the growth in population. The market for cows is excellent, California and Arizona requiring large numbers. High priced land in southern California represents too much of an investment for it to be used in raising young stock, so dairy men run many head on small places and buy cows that are producing.

Cows should be of good type and their production should be recorded, preferably through the work done in a regularly conducted testing association, Mr. Loughary said.

The hog production of Oregon should be about doubled if the state is to fill its own pork requirements, H. A. Lindgren, extension specialist in animal husbandry told the crowd. Last year Oregon raised 225,000 hogs and bought 130,000 from middle western states. He did not recommend hog raising as a major operation under conditions prevailing here but said that dairy men could safely figure on keeping one pig for each milk cow to consume skim milk and to take care of other waste products on the farm.

Dairy cattle that are sold for slaughter in the Portland market are increasing in numbers each year and may be expected to increase as dairying grows, George F. Pierson, president of the North Portland stock yards said. Last year 32,000 head of dairy cattle were slaughtered for meat in Portland. He suggested that more fat on dairy animals makes them more acceptable to the market.

He also decried the lack of interest in pork production and urged farmers to keep a sow where there is much milk available.

P. M. Brandt, head of the dairying department at the college told of some of the principal requirements for success in dairy farming. He was followed by J. D. Mickle, state dairy and food commissioner who pointed to the agricultural comeback that has been staged by farmers on irrigated lands in southern Idaho where dairying has grown by leaps and bounds. He urged the development of dairying for the Hermiston country as one of the best means of making the farm profitable.
