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FIGHTING U. S. TRADITIONS

In more ways than one there is a relationship between the Coolidge campaign for the third term and the boom to make Al Smith democratic nominee next year. The publicity for Smith and Coolidge, come in the main from the same sources. There are individual publications of course to which this characterization does not apply but it does, apply to the nationwide channels through which publicity is distributed. There is a pronounced tendency to "play up" Coolidge and Smith, and an equally pronounced purpose to "play down" Lowden, McAdoo and others.

The Coolidge movement seems to have taken on increased prestige as the South boom has advanced and it is easy to understand why. Disinterested writers who have gone into such border states as Kentucky and Tennessee report that Coolidge can carry those states against Smith but would be beaten by any democrat other than Al Smith. That is to say Smith would lose the border states, perhaps even some states in the south, and it is taken for granted he would lose Ohio and Indiana since those states are also dry. It means Smith cannot be elected.

What the Coolidge forces don't want is a battle over the west and midwest. These regions are agricultural and alignment comprised of such states with the border states and south would insure a Coolidge defeat. Hence the value to Coolidge of the Smith boom, which if successful will take the battle away from territory unsafe from a Coolidge standpoint and stage the fight in the east where the president is entrenched. The Coolidge forces are concerned about an agricultural revolt but they are not worried over facing an opponent running on a "beer keg" platform. Whether they know it or not the Smith people are working to free Mr. Coolidge of his chief source of headache.

However, the relationship does not end there. The Coolidge and Smith forces have a common interest with reference to nullification though for different reasons. The Tammany forces wish to nullify the eighteenth amendment, the Coolidge forces the anti-third term tradition. One side would upset the written organic law while the other would strike down an unwritten law that thus far has been as binding as though a part of the constitution itself.

There is much press hullabaloo about the popularity and the ability of both Smith and Coolidge. It is chiefly bunk. They are men of average ability only and the candidacy of each man actually runs counter to the accepted traditions of the American people. If the presidential campaign is to be between these two men our political life is at a low ebb.

There is a ray of hope however in the fact that it is still a year before convention delegates are to be chosen. It is quite possible that within that time the public will become conscious of the situation and will demand a presidential election in lieu of the Punch and Judy show for which the stage is being set.—Pendleton East Oregonian.

The estimated population is about 275,000, most of which consists of native Papuans.
