OUTSIDERS CONTINUE TO SHOW INTEREST IN STATE

New Settlers Come During August and Many Inquiries Made By Prospects.

The first fifteen days of August have registered twenty-five new settlers in the records of the land settlement department of the Portland and state Chambers of Commerce. These recent newcomers, according to the real estate men and local committee, have invested over \$82,000 in the lands which they have purchased since coming to Oregon from other states.

Interest in Oregon lands continues active with daily arrival in the state of farmers who have been in correspondence with the department. In addition to the letters being received from those who have been in touch with the department for as long as two or three years, a steady stream of new inquiries call for information and literature about Oregon farm opportunities. During the first half of August 577 letters have been received by the department. Many of these come as direct results of railroad advertising while a large number are sent by those whose friends and former neighbors have already availed themselves of the services of the land settlement organization and settled in Oregon. Signed questionnaires have been furnished by 46 inquiries, since the first of August, of whom 36 stated definitely that they were making arrangements to come to Oregon. They

anticipate making investments here which will approximate \$74,000. A close check is kept on the records of those who thus designate their intention to come to Oregon and follow up letters are sent them from time to time. In this way it has been ascertained that a very large percentage of those using the department's service in obtaining information take advantage of the opportunities offered and establish themselves in the state, usually within a year after their decision to come.

In answering new inquiries and furnishing information to those who contemplate coming to Oregon as farm settlers, the land settlement department sent out 2,026 letters during the first two weeks of August, with 479 packages of illustrated literature describing agriculture in Oregon.

Howell of Grants Pass has put up a registered Guernsey and Jacob Luscher & Sons, Fairview Holstein Farm, Fairview, Oregon, have donated a Holstein heifer, worth \$150, that will be awarded to some hard working club member.

The Holstein calf by Segis Pontiac Beets, full brother to the world's record three-year-old cow sired by Segis Pontiac De Kol Burkle 2nd, the black and white will be awarded to the highest scoring Oregon calf club member. The points will be 25 each on animal, herdsmanship, showmanship and record book. A member may enter either a grade or purebred female or a purebred bull calf in the competition.
