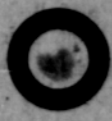

### ADDITIONAL EDITORIAL

#### A FRIENDLY TIP

Recently a contemporary, the Arlington Bulletin, carried a plaint in its editorial columns that the editor had visited Portland over a period of eight years and had never qualified for roll call in the "Those Who Come and Go" column of the Oregonian.

The editor of the Herald has no actual experience to guide him in making a recommendation for membership, having imposed his presence on Portland very, very little, but he would make the friendly suggestion that the editor of the Bulletin on his next trip get in touch with John W. Kelly, "conductor," and tell him the yarn about the time the Arlington country had the red snow. That one is a whopper, and under Mr. Kelly's deft touch, we are ready to believe the story might become a masterpiece. Incidentally, the Bulletin editor would break into the column.

Of what use is a flower show, the crab or cynic might ask. Hermiston just had one, and it was something of a revelation to those who may be inclined to pay too little attention to the blossoms. A country without flowers lacks one of the gracious touches that go to make a country of homes, and women of the Hermiston country gave clear proof in the entries made that this part of home making is done here to perfection.

### CULLING THE EWE FLOCK

#### BUILDS UP UNIFORM STOCK

Ewes kept for breeding purposes should be at least average in size for the breed they represent, says H. A. Lindgren, animal husbandry specialist at the Oregon State college extension service. The ewe flock is gone over carefully before breeding and those not up to standard are culled out.

A Shropshire ewe should weigh 150 pounds, a Hampshire 185, an Oxford 220, a Dorset 180 and a Merino 130, with all other breeds in proportion. The size of ewes is cut down by too early breeding. It is not a good practice to breed ewes to lamb under two years of age.

"Only healthy, active ewes should be kept for breeding," says Mr. Lindgren. "Listless, unthrifty ewes seldom produce good lambs. A bright pink skin is an indication of the thriftiness of the ewes. Parasites such as stomach worms, lung worms and the like tear down the vitality of the ewe. Unless a ewe responds to parasite treatment and increased feed, do not keep her in the flock."

Constitution, a valuable asset in the ewe, is indicated by a wide deep chest and wide sprung rib or heart girth. A weak constitution in the ewe is not associated with good thrifty lambs. Ewes that make the best mothers have a mild, bright eye, a feminine or matronly appearance, and quality as shown in the texture of the wool, size of the bone and refinement of the features.

The ram, which is in reality half of the flock, is gone over carefully to see that it is good conformation and right age. Other points considered are the lamb market the year before, quality of the lambs produced by the ram and whether the ram is increasing the average fleece weight of the flock.

Rev. A. J. Ware, pastor of the Baptist church, was expected to return today from Portland where he has been for some time convalescing after an operation for appendicitis. Dowell has filled the pulpit for Sunday morning services, and the members of the congregation have joined with the Methodists in union services in the evening.
