er, the water district was formed, and he was continuously a member of this board, some of the time as its president, an office held by him at the time of his death.

He was the chief author of two important contracts between the government and the district, both of which were slowly evolved over periods of several months. Colonel McNaught took a deep interest in all public questions touching on the welfare of the project and the town.

His own qualities of leadership and the graciousness of his wife gave them a position in the life of the community rarely found.

Besides his wife he is survived by a son and a daughter, Carl S. McNaught of Hermiston, and Mrs. E. H. Geary of Portland; and three grandchildren.

Out of respect to the memory of Colonel McNaught, all places of business in the city were closed between the hours of 10 and 12:30 Saturday morning.
