Hugh Taylor in the course of a conversation on the showing of pens of birds at fairs and shows said, "You must begin to prepare the birds almost a month before your show. Of course, through careful feeding you must get them in perfect condition as to flesh and alertness. Then wash them carefully in warm, weak suds. Some exhibitors of White Leghorns rinse them in weak bluing water. Put your chickens in an enclosure kept as near dustless as possible and give them straw to scratch in that has been washed to free it from dust. Change this frequently. Oil meal in the feed helps to give a glossiness to the plumage of the birds. If care is taken after giving the birds the first bath it will not be necessary to repeat before the show. Have the shanks scrupulously clean, clean the toenails and polish the nails and beaks."
