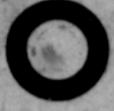

### FIGHTER GETS THRILL AS CAR DOES SPIN ON ROAD

A peculiar accident happened on the highway just on the edge of town Sunday morning when a Portland man, driving to Portland from Enterprise, suddenly found that the steering apparatus on his car was useless. The car, running at a fair rate of speed, turned into the bank at the side of the road, striking it squarely, head on. The force of the impact threw the rear of the car around until that end struck.

Still enough momentum was left to turn the car once more, and it swung around and came to rest with the front wheels pointed in the direction the car was originally going. A passenger in the car had participated in a boxing match in Enterprise the night before, and he said he did not get half so dizzy when he was hit on the jaw in the ring as he did in those few seconds.

Lost Mail Plane Found.  
Los Angeles, Cal.—The wreck of the air mail plane, from which Pilot Charles R. Bowman parachuted to safety in the mountains 75 miles north of here, was found within a half mile of the spot where the flier landed. The mail, which included \$750,000 in securities, \$215,000 of which were negotiable, was found intact.

More Armed Police Enter Coal Fields.  
Denver.—As additional armed state police entered southern Colorado coal fields Monday with orders from Governor William H. Adams to halt picketing of coal mines, prospects that all strike leaders would be arrested were seen here.

The program for his visit has not been completed yet, but it will include a banquet for all Masons and members of the Eastern Star to be held in the Methodist church at 6 o'clock on the date of the meeting.

Beer-Making Stock Returned to Owner  
Minneapolis, Minn.—Government efforts to stop sales of malt and other materials for use in home brewing was partly rebuffed in federal court here when Judge William A. Cant held illegal the seizure of the \$15,000 stock of the Cleco Supply company here October 8, and ordered it released, subject to a libel proceeding also brought by the government.

### Marvelous Stone Car in Old Indian Temple

When the Mohammedans invaded the kingdom of Vijayanagar in the Sixteenth century, they wrought tremendous havoc on all the great guldries of that great city, says a writer in a Calcutta paper. Today, as one rambles over it, there is hardly to be seen a structure that does not show evidence of the iconoclastic proclivities of the invaders.

It is interesting to note that one of the unique structures among the ruins, a temple car made of stone, has apparently been untouched. This is the more striking as the temple, in the courtyard of which the car stands, has been terribly treated, some of the finest carving in the whole city being broken and shattered out of all shape. This car is to be found in the vicinity of the Vitthalaswami temple, not far from the river.

After first appearance one is inclined to think the car has been carved out of a solid block of stone, but a closer examination shows this is not so. The joints between the various parts are wonderfully well done, and unless one looks at the structure carefully it is not surprising the impression of solidity should be given. The pilgrims who visit the place believe that they obtain merit by turning round the wheels, which are also made of stone. As a result of this devotion the axle has become very much worn. Two elephants of stone stand in front of the car.

### Uncle Sam's Islands

The Philippine Islands were ceded to the United States by the treaty of Paris, December 10, 1898, following the Spanish-American war. By the terms of this treaty the United States paid to Spain \$20,000,000 in connection with the relinquishment of all claims to the Philippines, Porto Rico and Guam, and under a later treaty of November 7, 1900, a further payment of \$100,000 was made to Spain for the cession to the United States of further islands of the Philippine archipelago.
