## Hear Pointer! Beginning Thursday Night December 8 In the Boynton Store Building James A. Pointer

WILL BEGIN A SERIES OF BIBLE STUDIES IN BOTH THE NEW AND OLD TESTAMENTS.

Mr. Pointer is an Eastern Oregon man, having spent some twenty years in Morrow county. He attended both O. A. C. and U. of O. and is a graduate of Eugene Bible University. Before taking up the evangelistic work he taught in Eugene and Minneapolis Bible universities for four years.

Early in the nineteenth century James O'Kelley, a Methodist minister, Abner Jones a Baptist minister, and Barton W. Stone, a Presbyterian minister, independent of each other, began to preach that denominationalism and division of the Church of Christ was wrong. They contended from the scriptures that all Christians should be united upon the Bible and that there should be just the Church of Christ. They based their argument upon the prayer of Christ in John 17:20-23: 1 Cor. 1:10 and the entire teaching of the new Testament on the subject of the Church.

Thomas and Alexander Campbell, Presbyterian ministers, looking for the light, soon came to the same position and began to preach that the New Testament Church of Christ should be restored and that the Church should function as it did in the Apostolic times. About 1830-36 the various peoples pleading for the Church of Christ were practically all united. Since that time in all parts of the world, the movement has grown until now there are about six million people standing for the New Testament Church. In Oregon there are one hundred and twenty-four congregations and numerically it is the second largest.

The plea of the Church of Christ is essentially: Union of all Christians upon the Bible without ecclesiastical overrule; the original Apostolic method of Church government; the practice of the ordinances of the Church as in Apostolic times.

## CHEESE FACTORY OPERATED

(Continued From Page One)

A concrete floor runs through the center of the building, with the stanchions facing it. A load of hay can be emptied from the wagon under cover and fed directly to the cows when weather is inclement. Concrete gutters slope toward the east end of the building and carry refuse to the outside. This refuse will be flushed into a big cement pit during the winter and in the spring will be mixed with sulphur, pumped into tanks that are mounted on wheels and driven to the fields for distribution.

Cement has been used wherever possible on his farm. The cheese factory building and cheese cellar, with granary above it, are of this construction, and beside the barn is a 78 ton capacity silo of concrete, topped with a water tank holding 2200 gallons, which supplies the entire farm with water under pressure. A substantial and capacious water trough for the cows is fitted with an automatic device which lets water flow in as the stock drinks, keeping the trough always full of fresh water without the attention of the herdsman. The silo forms, owned by the Farm Bureau were used in the construction of the silo, cheese cellar and granary.

A large boiler in the cheese making room generates steam which is used to heat the cheese vat, the cheese cellar and to heat water for the cows, both in the outside trough and in the wash sinks and troughs to be installed in the barn.

"I was ashamed for my cows, in the old buildings. Now they can be comfortable, and I will not have to be rerailing all the time. It costs more at first, but it pays in the time you save, and you are not ashamed," Mr. Anderegg said. "I have just had my fields plowed, too. I will plant for feed and silage. I have my plowing done with a tractor. It is done quicker than with horses and I do not have to feed horses that stand idle most of the time.

The watchwords of the Anderegg place are efficiency and thrift. Nowhere is waste, and every improvement tends toward the comfort and thereby the increased production of his herd.
