ZERO TEMPERATURE AND NINE INCHES OF SNOW GIVE WINTER FOOTHOLD IN THIS DISTRICT

Winter's grip seemed to be breaking today when out of gray skies rain began falling steadily before noon. The sight of rain seemed odd, due to the fact that it was falling on a blanket of snow several inches thick.

Cold weather has been offered Hermiston residents for several days. On the last day of the old year the mercury slipped down to two degrees below zero, and the maximum was only eight above. On December 30, the minimum was one below. The offering on December 31 was the coldest for the winter except for one day earlier in the month when three below was registered.

Snow accompanied the cold weather, together with a northeast wind. On December 31 eight-tenths of an inch of snow fell. On New Year's day the snowfall amounted to seven inches with another inch on the following day, a total of about nine inches.

Practically no damage has been caused by the cold snap, as far as reports from project farmers indicate.
