Court to Hear Wire Tapping Case. Washington, D. C. — The supreme court reversed itself and decided to consider the validity of evidence obtained in prohibition cases by wire tapping. Three cases from Seattle brought by Roy Olmsted, Charles S. Green, Edward S. McInnis and others, challenge the right of the government in prohibition cases to use evidence obtained by listening in on telephone wires. In all three the supreme court had refused to grant reviews, but it announced that it would go exhaustively into the subject to determine whether the government has been violating the constitutional rights of individuals.

Seattle Chosen as Host to Lawyers. New Orleans, La. — The executive of the American Bar association in session here selected Seattle, Wash., as the place for the next meeting of the association, which will be held from July 23 to 28.
