ON FUTURE OF DAIRYING

Superintendent of State Hospital Predicts Constant Growth of Business Here.

With proper management and an in-trol problems, dairying in the irrigated districts around Hermiston is bound to go ahead and become of more and more importance, according to the opinion expressed by Dr. W. D. McNary of Pendleton in a talk before the commercial club.

The work that Dr. McNary does is to be superintendent of the Eastern Oregon state hospital for insane at Pendleton, and one phase of that job is to manage a dairy herd that consists of 125 head of stock of all ages.

PROGRAMS FOR YEAR ARE

OUTLINED BY FARM BUREAU

Definite Policy of Having Set Program of Study to be Put Into Action.

A program for the year's activity that will provide one major topic for consideration at each regular monthly meeting has been adopted by the Umatilla Project Farm Bureau. Endorsement of such a suggestion was made at the January meeting, and the executive committee in a meeting Tuesday night drew up and approved such a program.

The outlined topics as submitted will make it possible for the organization to handle constructively some of the major problems of the project, one of the members pointed out, and there will be time left to handle any matter of current interest that seems to demand attention. The program adopted is as follows:

February meeting—Boys and girls club work, major topic; purchase of baby chicks; rabbit poisoning work; any project report.

March meeting—Poultry, major topic; brooding chicks; club work; farm crops, alfalfa varieties, treating seed potatoes; any project report; squirrel poisoning.

April meeting—Dairying, major topic; poultry on range; pasture grasses; any project report; turkey management; irrigation problems.

May meeting—Farm management, major topic; boys' and girls' club work picnic; cow testing association results discussed; any project discussion; silage for dairy cows.

June meeting—Discussion of farm flocks of sheep; marketing co-operative; any project discussion.

July meeting—Poultry management and diseases; moving pullets to laying quarters; culling poultry; discussion on any project.

August meeting—Discuss hog management, feeding, breeding; parasite control; winter breeding of lambs any project discussion.

September meeting—Umatilla Project fair; boys and girls club work; project discussion.

October meeting—Fattening turkeys for market; discussion of results of demonstration; breeding for egg production; project discussion.

November meeting—Rodent control; volume of the farm business; project discussion.

December meeting—Keeping farm records; rodent control; project discussion.
