houses are a necessity. The floors may be either concrete or board. Succulent feed for winter handling of flocks is a necessity, Mr. Jenkins said and recommended the growing of carrots as the ideal crop for this purpose.

"The survey does not indicate as high a labor income per farm as we would like to see, or receive," the assistant county agent said, "but it does show us the causes that are preventing us from receiving more per farm. With the remedies suggested, the goal of more money can be reached."

"My own personal conviction is that the fullest success of poultry raising here absolutely demands the use of permanent floors in winter laying houses. Internal parasites have weakened birds until production has been lowered. It's impossible to get rid of parasites unless the laying house has a permanent floor that can be scraped clean of refuse and sprayed to kill parasites and eggs of parasites."

FORMER RESIDENTS ESCAPE FLOOD IN SANTA PAULA

A telegram received this morning by Mrs. T. D. Worster from her uncle, E. E. Chamberlain, at Santa Paula, California, stated that Mr. and Mrs. Jack Smith escaped injury in the flood that occurred when a big dam went out and caused the death of several hundred people.

The telegram gave the further information that Mr. Chamberlain had inspected 63 bodies of those who perished in the flood on the day the message was sent.
