He helped draft the state income tax bill in 1923 and in 1922, acting with State Secretary Kozer as members of the state tax commission, reduced the state tax levy about \$750,000. Altogether, Mr. Ritner introduced but few bills but secured passage of over 90 per cent of those introduced.

Mr. Ritner the son of pioneer parents, was educated in Pendleton public schools and at Weston normal. He taught school, was a cub reporter and worked in the old Pendleton Savings Bank for 10 years. In 1908 he gave up banking and since that time has been a wheat raiser. He was vice-president and business manager of the Round-Up since its inception until 1918 when he resigned to go to France during the war. There he was division representative of the American Red Cross with rank of captain, being attached to the fifth division A. E. F., which saw active service for the last eight months of the war and engaged in the St. Mihiel and Argonne campaigns.

cattle, or in breeding of poultry to secure increased production, is of great importance. He cited findings of some scientific experimenters showing that greater producing capacity is transmitted from sire to daughters and not from dam to daughters.

Supt. Dean illustrated his talk on the results secured in this district by

tests for infectious abortion by means of charted tabulations on the black-board. The first time such tests were conducted in 1922, 43 per cent of the individual animals proved to be reactors. Control methods followed have resulted in the percentage of reactors being forced down to 12 per cent. Co-operation on the part of dairy men is necessary to make the control effective, the speaker said.

A trade has been completed whereby Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Brierley exchanged their 40 acre farm on the Stanfield project, near Cold Springs reservoir, for city property in Chehalis, Washington. Edward Hill is the new owner of the Brierley farm.

Mr. and Mrs. Brierley expect to move to Hermiston in the near future and will occupy the Johnson house which has been the home of Mr. and Mrs. Schilling for several months. Mr. Hill does not plan to move here until fall and probably will rent the place for this season. He plans to run cows and chickens when he assumes operation of the place.

Mr. and Mrs. Brierley are pioneer settlers of the Stanfield district. E. P. Dodd handled the deal for both parties.

### Ostrich Classified as an Error of Nature

The full-grown ostrich sometimes weighs more than 300 pounds and is as much as nine feet high, writes Martin Johnson in the Saturday Evening Post. His most marked characteristic is the fact that he has only two toes—the third and fourth—on each foot.

In South America there is another large bird—the rheu—which is also called an ostrich. This bird can be distinguished from the true ostrich by its having three toes instead of two. According to the biologists the original ostrich had five toes. However the modern bird can probably run faster with the two it has now than could his ancestors with five.

Arabian legend has it that the ostrich is the result of a union between the camel and a dodo bird. Certainly it inherited some of the worst characteristics of both. Its awkward shape, the uselessness of its wings, its seeming lack of pleasure in life, all indicate that it is one of nature's errors.

The only weapon at the command of the ostrich is its foot. The terrific downward stroke of its huge toe driven by a muscular thigh the thickness of a leg of mutton is easily the equal of the kick of a full-grown horse. A blow from it will break a rib or the backbone of any ordinary animal. In addition to the force of the blow, the sharp claw can tear skin and flesh like a military saber.

Washington, D. C.—The house veterans' committee reported favorably a bill appropriating \$15,000 for construction and improvement of veterans hospitals.

### Powers of Endurance in Wild Creatures

Dogs and wild animals of the sun-family are remarkable for their quickness and staying power in running. Wolves will travel 60 miles in a night. Nansen saw arctic foxes on the ice nearly 500 miles from land, and found their tracks in the snow on the parallel of 85 degrees north.

Eskimo dogs can travel 45 miles in five hours, according to Hayes, who relates that he drove his dog team seven miles in half an hour. A Siberian dog on good ice will draw about 80 pounds; our ordinary dogs at full speed run at the rate of from 33 to 45 feet per second; setters and pointers can travel about 18 1/2 to 21 7-10 miles per hour, and can maintain this speed for two or even three hours.

Foxhounds are very fast, and in a recent trail one of them beat a thoroughbred horse, covering four miles in six minutes and a half. Greyhounds can run at the rate of 50 to 75 feet per second.

### Many Uses for Flaxseed

Flaxseed is grown primarily for the production of linseed oil, each short ton of seed producing from 70 to 80 gallons of oil, which is used in the manufacture of paints and varnish, linoleum, oilcloth, printers' ink, patent leather, imitation leather and sundry other products. The cake that is left after the oil is pressed out is valued as a feed for dairy and beef cattle and finds a ready market. A large part of the cake produced in this country is exported, principally to the Netherlands, Belgium and the United Kingdom. The United States is the second largest producer of flaxseed in the world, but, in spite of this fact this country is also the world's largest importer of this product. Our production ordinarily takes care of about 55 per cent of our domestic requirements. This year the United States produced approximately 24,270,000 bushels.

### Less Rain in Future?

During the last half century the world's average rainfall has, according to weather records, decreased about one per cent. This has been considered due to outside influences such as variation in sunlight, but an Indian weather expert has put forward a suggestion for the decrease that is quite plausible.

He suggests that the lack of rain may be due to an oil film, less than a millionth of an inch thick, spread on the surface of the ocean by ships that burn oil for fuel. Evaporation of ocean water is the chief source of rain, and this film of oil may be sufficient to retard evaporation.

Sacramento Valley is Flooded.  
Sacramento, Cal.—A woman and a baby were reported drowned, 400 refugees were homeless and North Sacramento and surrounding territory were under water as rain-swollen floods swept down from the hills. Frantic calls for motor boats have been sent up and down the river as more than 600 persons are reported isolated in homes buried to the eaves in water.

Senator Ferris of Michigan Dies.  
Washington, D. C.—Senator Woodbridge N. Ferris, democrat of Michigan, died of bronchial pneumonia. It is expected that the death of Mr. Ferris will decrease the democratic strength in the senate by one vote. Governor Green of Michigan, who has the power of appointing his successor, is a republican and is expected to appoint someone from his own party.

Immigration Quota Measure Postponed  
Washington, D. C.—The senate has passed the Johnson resolution postponing for another year the institution of national origins as a basis for computing immigration quotas.

Canada Divorces Showing Increase.  
Ottawa, Ont.—Divorces granted in Canada in 1927 showed an increase of 23 per cent over 1926, statistics compiled by the dominion bureau of statistics reveal.
