The Inland Empire Educational association held its 30th annual meeting April 4 to 6 in the Lewis and Clark high school at Spokane, Washington. Over 3200 teachers were present making this the largest meeting ever held. It was divided into two daily sessions. The general session was held in the morning and the department work was held in the afternoon. The addresses of all the general sessions were broadcast from Spokane. Of the speakers Dr. McAndrews, former superintendent of Chicago schools, was said to be the most popular but Dr. Burton of the University of Chicago and Miss Virginia Adair, president of the National Education association of Richmond, Virginia, were prominent speakers.

There were two banquets given, the first on Wednesday at the Davenport hotel. Between 600 and 800 teachers were present; the second, on Thursday evening, was given by the Inland Empire School Master's club in the Masonic temple. More than 1500 men were seated. Mr. Cherry, superintendent of Hermiston schools, was elected secretary of Inland Empire Superintendents and Principals association.

Friday afternoon the fourth and fifth grades had an Easter egg hunt.

The second grade pupils had an Easter egg hunt last Friday. Miss Petri hid the eggs in the sagebrush.

The pupils of the fourth grade have begun a new book, "The Columbus Reader," which is a reader and history combined. They are still studying manufacturing and are going to inspect some printing products which the Herald loaned them.
