from climbing in. The mink is the natural enemy of the muskrat and there have been mink found in this vicinity.

The sides of the pond have been diked up pretty well and in these banks the muskrat build their homes, the entrance under water among the tules, a runway going obliquely up into the bank to above water level, where the passageway opens up into several sections or nests. There is an opening to the outside of the bank but this is made for ventilation and is used for an exit only in times of emergency.

The rats feed on shoots of aquatic plants, bulbs of the tules, young clover and alfalfa, and are particularly fond of apples and carrots. During the day they come out of the pond and feed, or lie half covered in forms they make of dried grasses. They are very shy, and at the slightest disturbance slip quietly into the water.

Dr. Gilliland operates his farm under a license and pelts are sold from the place out of season only by the payment of a fee to the state commission and must be marked by tags from that department. When asked about the market for pelts, Dr. Gilliland said, "The largest muskrat farm

in this country is in Canada. Last year the owners received an order for one million pelts. They were able to supply one-half of the skins wanted."
