E. P. Illsley is painting his house on Gladys avenue.

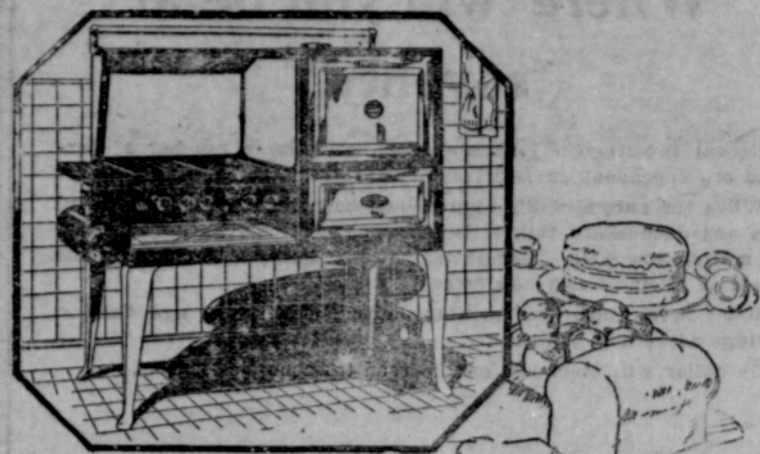
RICHMOND'S ARCADIAN'S HERE TUESDAY NEXT
