Pausing in the midst of a whirlwind campaign through the second congressional district, S. E. Notson, candidate for the nomination for representative in congress at the republican primary election May 18, has announced a platform as brief in statement as it is definite in meaning. As he swings around the circuit on his speaking tour, Mr. Notson will amplify the things he stands for. The planks on his platform follow:

1. Construction of the Umatilla Rapids project.
2. More liberal forestry policy on the part of the national government.
3. More liberal support of good roads.
4. Unflinching enforcement of the 18th amendment.
5. Court to settle international disputes with proper protection of national sovereignty.
6. Development of the resources of the Northwest.
7. Outlawry of war.
8. Just treatment of former soldiers.

It is Mr. Notson's announced purpose to meet just as many voters as possible before election, and he is pushing his campaign with characteristic vigor. He feels that if he can carry his message to the voters of the district he can win the nomination and have the opportunity of bearing the party standard in the fall election.

In this issue of The Herald appears the announcement of Senator Fred E. Kiddle for candidate for delegate at large to the republican national convention. Mr. Kiddle is a young man but has been prominent in politics for a number of years.

In 1916 while attending the University of Oregon, he was president of the Hughes for President Student club at the university.

During the world war Mr. Kiddle sort of dropped out of local politics being more concerned in the then great question which concerned the boys in olive drab who were over "where do we go from here," but upon his return to the states when there was no further need of American soldiers in France, he became active in American Legion affairs here and has been in attendance at most of the national conventions of the Legion. He is past commander of his own post and a past state commander of Oregon. He is now a member of the Oregon senate, representing Union, Umatilla and Morrow counties and also the state manager of the Herbert Hoover presidential campaign in Oregon.

W. O. Staver, of Pilot Rock, republican candidate for joint representative of Umatilla and Morrow counties, was in Hermiston Wednesday in the interest of his campaign for this office.

The United States board of tax appeals ruled that Senator James Couzens, republican, Michigan, would not have to pay a \$10,000,000 assessment made by the internal revenue bureau on profits derived from sale of Ford stock.

Governor Al Smith received a plurality of approximately 35,000 over the combined vote of Senators Reed and Walsh in the California democratic preferential primary. Secretary of Commerce Hoover, unopposed for the republican delegation, was given a complimentary vote of 564,970.

**525 Are Killed in City Traffic.**  
 Washington, D. C.—Motor car accidents were responsible for 525 deaths in 77 large cities during the four weeks ending April 21, according to figures made public here by the commerce department. This shows an increase of 35 deaths over the four weeks ending April 23, 1927. New York reported the greatest number of motor car accident deaths during the period with 95. Chicago was second with 63 and Los Angeles third with 28.

**RAILWAY PAYS HUGE SUM IN TAXES TO COUNTY**

Checks aggregating \$120,478.87 were mailed to R. T. Cookingham, sheriff of Umatilla county, from the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation Company headquarters in Portland May 5, covering the first payment of the 1927 taxes levied upon the property of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company in Umatilla county. The total taxes levied against the railroad's property in Umatilla county amounted to \$240,957.71, distributed as follows: School taxes, \$139,263.63; road taxes, \$64,093.07; city taxes, \$12,632.17; world war veterans state fund, \$3,765.81; state military fund \$33.19; and county soldiers relief \$263.49. J. W. Morrow, the railroad's general tax agent, stated.
