FIFTY-NINTH ANNUAL COMMENCEMENT AT STATE COLLEGE

With more than 500 seniors and graduate students to be granted degrees June 4, and with hundreds of alumni returning for annual reunions the fifth-ninth annual commencement program June 1-4 promises to be packed with traditional and special events. Among the latter is the laying of the corner stone for the big Memorial union building now nearing completion.

This ceremony will precede the military tournament on Bell field and it in turn will be followed by the annual alumni banquet tendered by President and Mrs. W. J. Kerr. The golden jubilee class of 1878 and the silver jubilee group of 1903 are having special reunions this year, as are the more recent classes of 1915 to 1918 inclusive. Former students from every part of the state and more distant points are going.

Official ceremonies of graduation will be given Sunday with the baccalaureate service at which Dr. Herbert S. Johnson, prominent Boston minister formerly of Oregon, will be the speaker. Monday morning the commencement exercises will be held when Dr. S. B. L. Penrose, president of Whitman college, will be the speaker. Degrees will be conferred by President Kerr as usual.

Of the total students to be graduated, 505 are candidates for the bachelor's degree and 17 for the master's. Every county in the state except three is represented in the group. TEX RANKIN WILL TRY FOR ENDURANCE FLIGHT RECORD

The definite date set by Tex Rankin, veteran pilot of Portland, Ore., for his attempt to better both his solo endurance and the endurance flight records will be June 5 off the beach at Seaside, Oregon. Long months of rain, in which there has scarcely been a week of flying weather, caused the postponement of the flight.

The pioneer aviator of the northwest plans to make the attempt alone. He came to this decision after the tests he made with the Ryan monoplane in which he will make the trial. He will reduce the load of the plane by almost 400 pounds by making the attempt alone and in proportion, he believes, will increase the safety of the take-off and the first 12 hours of hazardous flight.

Rankin flew the huge monoplane which has an extra four feet on the wings, on a long cross-country flight to Boise, Idaho, recently to determine how it would act under different conditions. He tested it thoroughly in all kinds of weather and at many altitudes. He knows exactly what the plane will do under different conditions.

He will take off on the 30 mile beach at Seaside with 550 gallons of gasoline which, he estimates, from recent test, will keep him in the air 55 hours, almost two hours better than the present endurance flight record. The endurance flight record is now held by George Haldeman and Edward Stinson at 53 hours 36 minutes and 30 seconds.

FARM NOTES

Maximum development of color and leafiness in alfalfa, the two chief factors in high grade hay, is dependent upon cutting before the half bloom stage. Different fields of alfalfa will vary in time at which they begin to lose their green color, but between one-tenth to one-half bloom is usually the proper time to cut, reports the Oregon experiment station.
