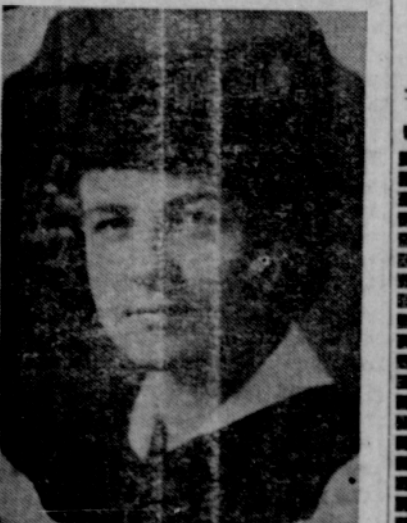

### ELDORA KINGSLEY MEMBER GRADUATING CLASS AT O. A. C.

Oregon State Agricultural College, Corvallis, May 31-Hermiston is represented by Eldora M. Kingsley in the graduating class of 1928 which totals more than 500. Miss Kingsley will receive her degree at the annual commencement exercises June 4. The graduating class is composed of those who have survived four years of rigorous work during which their scholarship had to be kept high to meet the requirements here. The college does not grant a degree to one whose average is less than a C even though he may have accumulated sufficient credits.

Miss Kingsley has completed her work for bachelor of science degree in vocational education. This school has made remarkable growth in recent years to keep pace with the demand for teachers of industrial subjects in high schools. It has further advanced this year under the new leadership of Dean James R. Jewell, by taking the degree course in this school, Miss Kingsley has prepared



herself for more work in teaching related vocational subjects or for supervisory or administrative positions in vocational work than is possible where a student major's in one of the technical schools. The school includes teacher training in commerce, agriculture, home economics and industrial education, and work in psychology and education.

While in college Miss Kingsley has taken an active part in campus activities, being a prominent member of the women's athletic association.
