U. OF O. AND O. A. C. LIST WORK OFFERED BY THE SCHOOLS

University of Oregon, Eugene, June 7-Prospective students planning to attend one of the higher institutions of learning maintained by the state of Oregon can now see at a glance just what work is offered at both the University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural College by the catalogs issued by the two for this year. According to a recent ruling of the board of higher curricula this information is printed in the front of the catalog for each institution, and it appears in the University of Oregon catalog just issued.

Announcements of both schools indicate what schools and departments grant degrees, and which of the departments are "service departments" with courses offered only as supplementary to other departments.

At the University of Oregon degrees are granted in the college of literature science and the arts, in the graduate school, and in the following professional schools: architecture and allied arts, business administration, journalism, law, medicine, music physical education, sociology and Portland school of social work. Degree granting departments of the college of liberal arts include biology and its divisions, chemistry, economics, English, geology, Germanic languages, Greek, history, Latin, mathematics, military science, philosophy, physics, political science, psychology, Romance languages.

The university has one service department plainly specified as such. This is household arts, of which the catalog says, "No major work and no professional training is given in this department and no degrees are granted."

The agricultural college, according to its statements, grants degrees in the school of agriculture, department of chemical engineering, school of commerce, school of engineering and mechanical arts, school of forestry, school of home economics, department of military science and tactics, school of mines, school of pharmacy, and school of vocational education.

The agricultural college announcements lists the "school of basic arts and sciences and other departments" and says of this classification, "In these departments no major work is offered and no degrees granted." Departments are art and rural architecture, bacteriology, botany and plant pathology, chemistry, English language and literature, entomology, history, mathematics, modern languages, physics, public speaking and dramatics, zoology, industrial journalism, library practice, music and physical education for men and women. Education and psychology are listed as service departments under the school of vocational education.

CALF CLUB AWARDS TO BE MADE AT STATE FAIR

4-H calf club members will be much interested in the special awards which are to be made at the Oregon state fair this fall, according to County Agent Holt at Pendleton.

Governor I. H. Patterson, who has always shown a keen interest in boys' and girls' club work, will award a yearling bred heifer to the state champion dairy club member. For the benefit of calf club members exhibiting in this competition, it is pointed out that the award will be made on the following basis: Animal exhibited, 25 per cent; herdsman, 25 per cent; showmanship, 25 per cent; record book, 25 per cent.

The club member winning the Governor's award will choose the breed. Arrangements have been completed whereby each of the state cattle breed associations will have on the fair grounds at Salem a bred heifer ready to award without delay.

In addition to the Governor's Special, three purebred heifer calves, valued at \$150 each will be awarded as follows:

Guernsey heifer calf by the Oregon Guernsey Cattle club.

Jersey heifer calf by E. H. Wise of Grants Pass.

Holstein heifer calf by Jacob Lischer & Sons, of Fairview, Oregon.

LABOR CONDITIONS IN VARIOUS PARTS OF THE STATE

Following is a report according to districts or localities of seasonal employment conditions in Oregon:

Portland—here is still a large surplus of unemployed in this locality, however the seasonal work which has started will lessen this surplus to some extent. Present indications are that we will have a surplus of help on hand throughout the entire season.

Salem—The local supply of labor is sufficient to fill all present demands. When the fruit is ripe we expect to need some outside help as we always do.

Eugene—The supply of labor equals the demand and all local labor is well employed. Present indications are that there will be a shortage of labor when all construction projects get in operation that are planned as hay and harvest comes on. We have a good many transients registering at times.

McMinnville—We have a surplus of help in all lines of work and expect this surplus to exist throughout the season.

Forest Grove—All local help is employed and the present indications are that we will have enough help to handle all future work. When berries are ripe then all available help will be employed.

Corvallis—We have a small transient surplus but local help pretty well employed.

Gresham—All local labor is well employed at present but will need a good many berry pickers soon.

Hoop River—Berry picking is just begun and the present indications are that there will be a shortage of help if the weather turns hot.

La Grande—There is a surplus of help on hand especially noticeable in the lumber industry. Present indications are for a future surplus owing mainly to continuous flow of motorists through the country, many seeking work. There are probably 250 people out of work, 20 per cent local and 80 per cent transient.

Medford—All local help is employed and there is no indication of any surplus at present.

Marshfield—A fairly good balance being maintained at present, the surplus being of common labor. There are about 100 people out of employment, 30 per cent local residents and 70 per cent transients.
