### UNIVERSITY OF OREGON SELECTS HEAD FOR ONE OF IMPORTANT FACULTY POSTS

University of Oregon, Eugene, June 7—Recommendation for appointment to what is conceded as probably the most important faculty post to be filled at the University of Oregon this year goes to David Faville, former associate professor of business administration, who will become dean of the school of business administration next year.

At Harvard this year, Faville is understood to have accepted the position offered him and will take over active direction of the university's largest school this fall. Final confirmation of his appointment is to be asked of the board of regents at its June session.

Faville, a Portland man, will succeed two men who are considered among the most able business administration experts on the coast, Dr. C. E. Robbins, who has resigned, and Professor Franklin E. Folts, who has acted as dean this year. Both Robbins and Folts have accepted positions in the graduate school of

business administration at Harvard, the former to receive a salary of \$11,500 annually.

President Arnold Bennett Hall and other university officials expressed their gratification at Faville's acceptance for the important Oregon post and their confidence in his teaching and administrative ability. Continued growth of the business administration school, which has gained rapidly in attendance and prestige since its establishment in 1914, is expected under Faville's direction.

The new dean graduated from Stanford university in 1922, after pursuing his secondary educational work at Jefferson high school, Portland. After his graduation from Stanford he went to Pendleton where he taught a year in the high school. He went to Harvard to study for his master's degree, which he received in June 1925.

It was then that Faville first became associated with the University of Oregon school of business administration by accepting a position as associate professor of business administration.
