HERMISTON LOCALS

J. A. Birchfield and Floyd Kneer were Pendleton visitors Tuesday.

"Getting turkey poult started has been harder work this spring than in ordinary seasons, due to the cold wind that has prevailed so much of the time, but I've had fairly good success with my birds and expect to have a nice flock to sell this winter," said Walter Botkin. "The birds are doing fine now and are old enough that early season problems are about all solved."

Relatives here have received word from Mr. and Mrs. Sam Carson, former Hermiston residents, who left two weeks ago for their ranch at Caroline, Alberta. They ran into stretches in Canada where rain had been falling for 18 days and made 40 miles in a period of two driving days and had to be towed five times through bad places, according to the letter. Earl, Lester and Billy accompanied their parents.

"Bermuda onions have not done quite so well on the project this season as last year," said W. A. Mike-sell one day this week, "but we have no kick to register over the growth our plants made. We have some that are already mature, and they have made big bulbs. We'll have some to put on the market this week, and some growers are already marketing a part of their crop." Experiments with onion plants shipped in from Texas early in the spring were started last year, and results secured caused an increase in orders for this spring. Some of the local growers are reported to be receiving seven cents per pound for their early crop.

Many people are complaining about the prevalence of winds this year, but W. A. Leathers thinks 1928 is repeating the record established 20 years ago in 1908. "I recall that we had wind that season all during June," he said. "It continued until July 3, and then hot weather started. It wouldn't surprise me if we would continue having wind with hot waves of a day or two duration for some little time, after the odd brand of weather we have been having this season to date."

Having 80 or more birthday's to one's credit results in making a lot of people seem old, but A. J. Upham of Chicago retains such vigor at that age as to make himself an exception to the rule. He arrived Monday for an extended visit at the home of his son, C. L. Upham. The elder Mr. Upham is a Civil war veteran. One of his activities during the spring months has been experimental work in truck gardening to ascertain the results of applied paper mulching in stimulating crop growth and early maturity. He spends several hours a day in such work as a part of his activities when at home.

Natives of the jungles of Africa are likely to be of a philosophical turn of mind, as is illustrated by the story of an old Bantu negro told by Dau Crawford, who spent most of his life as a missionary in the wilds of the Dark continent. "Yes, I think it is," I replied.
"Then very slowly and gravely the old Bantu said:
"Well, Mr. Crawford, to be better off is not always to be better."—Detroit News.

Signatures of Great

Artists Not Genuine

The average old painting has a more colorful past than has been supposed. Judging by X-ray studies reported from the Roentgen experiment station at the Vienna Central Institute for Radiology. Three-fourths of the pictures that have the reputation of being painted between the Fifteenth and Eighteenth centuries are not what their proud possessors think they are, it is estimated. Some of the "old masters" are really not so old, the X-ray reveals. Some are as old as they seem, but the name of a great artist has been forged over the signature of the real painter, a lesser light of the same period. A few paintings wear false color, at a disadvantage. These canvases were originally painted by men of the first rank, and later were stupidly covered by entirely new pictures, much less beautiful.
