SAYORS WILL PRODUCE 1000 CAPONS THIS YEAR

A big increase in the capon business on the J. W. Saylor ranch on Butter creek is being registered this year, according to Ralph Saylor who is associated with his father in the farming operations.

"We expect to produce about 1000 capons for market this year," the younger Mr. Saylor said. "All of our birds except possibly a couple of dozen will be Barred Rocks. They made a good showing for us last year, and we're sticking by them. They are starting off fine this year."

Turkeys are also produced on the big ranch on a large scale. Success with turkeys has not been up to the showing of last year, he said. The cold, windy spring made it more difficult to start the poult, and the losses were slightly more than in other years.

FARM REMINDERS

Except as a pastime, planting new and untried varieties of "freak" crops in Oregon is usually an expensive and unprofitable venture, says the farm crops department at the experiment station. The station is testing hundreds of varieties as rapidly as they appear and can usually give authentic information on proposed crops or varieties for the asking.

In spite of the fact that potatoes were unusually cheap in Oregon last year, much poor seed was planted. This has resulted in some poor stands and diseased plants. Where stalks appear badly mottled or curled in the leaves, they are best pulled out and then removed entirely from the field to prevent disease spread, says the experiment station.

Weeds are abundant in many newly sown alfalfa fields in Oregon, finds G. R. Hyslop, chief in farm crops, in a tour of parts of the state. Where these are bad enough to shade the young alfalfa the field had best be clipped, he says, as this checks the weeds more than the alfalfa. If weeds are few the field had best be left alone until the new crop blooms, when it can be cut for hay.

Fight at Louvain Ended by Hoover.

Louvain, Belgium.—A message from Herbert Hoover apparently has prevented an inscription with the Latin equivalent of "destroyed by Teutonic fury" from appearing on the Louvain library. Whitney Warren, American architect, had argued that the inscription should remain as provided in the library plans, and Monsignor Ladeuze, rector of the university, urged it be eliminated. As chairman of the commission for relief in Belgium Mr. Hoover granted the university full jurisdiction as to the inscription to be placed on the memorial.

Dry Law Repeal Petition Checked.

Salem, Or.—Petitions for an initiative measure seeking repeal of all prohibition provisions in the state constitution, and all laws in Oregon having to do with the enforcement of the prohibition statutes, were being checked in the county clerk's office here. It was said that the petitions contained approximately 1000 signatures. The work of checking petitions also is in progress in other counties in the state, officials said.

UNIVERSITY COMMITTEE TO AID WITH INFORMATION

Florence Woughter Heads Group To Serve Prospective Students Here.

University of Oregon, Eugene, July 5—Prospective University of Oregon students of Hermiston will be given complete information on what courses to take and other phases of university life by members of the Greater Oregon committee, a student organization which will have contacts in every part of the state during the summer. Florence Woughter will have charge of the work in Hermiston, while Vawter Parker, of Heppner is general chairman of the district which includes Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam and Wheeler counties. He will have for other assistants, James Raley, Pendleton; Harold Blackburne, Arlington; Ivan Neal, Condon; Nan Cray, Echo; Ray Dudley, Athena; Harper Barnard, Fossil; Wilbur Shannon, Helix; Marjorie Clark, Heppner; Eva Balseiger, Ione; Harold Johnson, Milton-Freewater; Terrence King, Mitchell; Harold Kester, Pilot Rock; Virginia Key, Weston; Sylvannus Smith, Jr., Stanfield.

The University of Oregon is to put into effect two plans this year both of which will be of great aid to the students. The courses in the undergraduate division for the first two years have been revised, so that students may take general cultural subjects and specialize during the last two years. For students who wish to specialize immediately there are the professional schools. The second plan is that of the new personnel bureau which will be of service to students not only while they are in college, but before entering and after graduating as well.

Members of the Greater Oregon committee will confer with students interested, and it is planned to have several meetings in each district during the summer and early fall.
