ORDINANCE NO. 128

An Ordinance to amend Section 21 of Ordinance No. 104 entitled, "An Ordinance to regulate and control traffic and the use of the streets and other public places in the City of Hermiston, providing for punishment of violations of this ordinance and for the disposition of funds arising from such violations, repealing Ordinance No. 71 and ordinances and parts of ordinance in conflict herewith and declaring an emergency.
THE CITY OF HERMISTON DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That section 21 of ordinance No. 104 passed by the Council and approved by the Mayor on the 20th day of April, 1921, be, and the same hereby is amended so as to read as follows:

Section 21. Any driver, operator, chauffeur, owner or other person, or any firm, association or corporation, who shall violate any of the provisions of his ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$2.00 or not more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the city jail one day for each \$2.00 of any fine that may be imposed, and a plea of guilty or forfeiture of bail shall be deemed a conviction for the purpose of imposing the fine above mentioned.
