**FASHION HINT**

**Of General Farm Interest**

The Salem Grange insists that bananas coming into the United States from South America should pay a tariff duty, as they compete with those which are produced in Florida and Hawaii.

Raising of beef cattle is becoming quite an industry in Coos and Curry counties, heretofore noted principally for dairy stock. It is expected that more than 50 carloads of fine Hereford and other beef breeds will be shipped from there to Portland markets this season.

New wheat has begun to move in this field, 87 cars coming down to tidewater last Thursday and 114 cars on Friday. Receipts for the season so far are 658 cars, while at the same time last year there were only 380 cars.

A big potato show is to be held at Oregon City in November, for which preparations are already in progress. The five varieties of potatoes chosen for the show are Burbank, American Wonder, British Queen, Earliest of All and Garnet Chilli. In the classification of the potatoes there will be twelve hills for each exhibit, and the digging of the tubers will be in charge of a committee.

The Hood River valley expects to harvest about 4,000 cars of apples and pears this season. Of Bartlett pears there will be about 400 tons, of Gravenstein apples about 75 cars. The rest will be late apples.

In Kansas the potato market is glutted by the early diggers, who are said to be sacrificing their stuff at half the cost of production. Crop estimates show that the potato yield this year the country over, will exceed 1927 by 9 per cent and the 5-year average by 15 per cent.

McNamer & Thompson, sheep buyers, have picked up 22 double-deck cars of lambs in the Heppner neighborhood and shipped them to Denver.

**Vigorous Fight Needed**

Walnuts, one of the most promising crops for western Oregon, is now threatened by the appearance of aphids, the dread scourge of that industry, which may cause terrible loss unless immediately checked. Nicotine dust is recommended, but there is a scarcity of dusting machinery. Growers have been advised to mix nicotine sulphate (black leaf forty) with water in the ratio of one and one-half pints to each 200 gallons of water. Dilute oil emulsion with the nicotine is also recommended. This spraying must be done within two or three days after the aphids appear.

**Cooked But Not Boiled**

Proper cooking of "boiled" eggs is a very important consideration and Uncle Sam says the following is the best method: "Use a double boiler; in the top part put the eggs with a cupful of boiling water for each egg to be cooked. Cover closely and keep warm over hot water in the lower part of the double boiler. Leave the eggs in hot water for 8 to 8 minutes if they are to be soft-cooked, and 30 minutes if they are to be hard cooked.

**Radio in Paper Plant**

Maine paper manufacturers have been employing the radio to test the quality (thickness, thickness, dampness) of paper produced. A radio fan, experimenting with paper to throw the set out of tune, discovered that the thickness, or other characteristics of the paper, produced a measurable difference in the regulation of the dial. The result has been the installation in several paper plants of a specially prepared radio apparatus on the paper machines to test the moisture content of papers, the radio reporting to the machine tender whether the paper is being dried to the exact extent required.

**Bottle Letter Delivered**

Unable to communicate with the mainland because heavy seas kept the relief ship from the lighthouse he was tending, the keeper of Dhu Hartach lighthouse, off the coast of Scotland, recently wrote a letter to a friend in Errald, Scotland. He placed it in a bottle with a note asking the finder to mail it. The bottle was found floating in the sea four days later by John Black, a farmer, who mailed the missive. Owing to delay in the mails, the letter was delivered in Errald within sight of Dhu Hartach, three weeks after it was written.
