**Cubans Cling to Old Instrument of Death**

The one machine that the Spaniards are credited with having imported into Cuba 134 years ago is still in use. It is the "garrote," instrument of death, which greatly resembles an old picture of an Inquisition machine of torture. For many years the garrote served the Spaniards, dealing death to Cuban rebels. Since the expulsion of the Old world rulers it has been used at the Havana penitentiary as the official instrument of execution.  
No place but in Cuba is the garrote used officially in executions. A prisoner operates the beheading device and gets money and a time decrease in compensation for his services.  
The Havana garrote is said to have taken 184 lives since it has been in Cuban use. Before that it was used in executing Spaniards accused of high treason.—Kansas City Star.

**Doran Says Liquor Shipments Less.**

Washington, D. C. — Prohibition Commissioner Doran asserted that effective work by the coast guard had caused a decrease of 9,000,000 gallons in liquor shipped from foreign ports intended for illegal entry into the United States during the fiscal year ending June 30. In 1927, he said, 14,000,000 gallons of liquor left foreign ports presumably for this country. In 1928 the amount dropped to 5,000,000.

Washington, D. C. — Organization meetings for republican women will be held in the far west and south, similar to the eastern gathering here and the middle western conference at Chicago, under plans announced by Mrs. Alvin T. Hert, vice-president of the republican national committee.

**First White House Boy Dies.**

Montgomery, Ala.—General Hal T. Walker, 83, Confederate veteran and first boy born in the White House at Washington, died here. General Walker's father was secretary to President James K. Polk, an uncle.

New York.—Babe Ruth, home run king of the major leagues, declares he will retire from baseball at the end of the 1929 season—no foolin'!

**Carranza's Body Given to Mexico.**

Laredo, Texas.—The body of Captain Emilio Carranza, Mexico's premier filer, who was killed in a crash in New Jersey while winging homeward from a good will tour to the United States, was returned to his home land in an imposing and colorful ceremony on the international bridge here.
