United States to Bar Fruit Trees.

Washington, D. C.—Importation into the United States of nursery stocks of apple, pear, quince and Mazzara cherry will be prohibited after July 1, 1930, under a decision of the federal horticultural board approved by Secretary Jardine. The availability of American-grown stocks of these fruits and the danger from possible entry of new fruit pests with foreign stocks were given by the board to justify the exclusion.

Like Many, Rochester Saw Light Too Late

A document of considerable historic and literary importance was recently sold in London. It is the original letter written by the famous Restoration wit, Lord Rochester, on his deathbed, recanting his sad past.

The letter was garbled as a broadside after his death, and even Bishop Burnett, to whom it was addressed, reproduced it inaccurately. It is of interest, therefore, to give his actual words:

"My most honrd, Dr. Burnett.—My spirit and body do decay soe equally together that I shall write you a letter as weak as I am. In person I begin to value Churchmen above all men in the world, and you above all the Churchmen I know most. If God be yet pleased to spare mee longer in this world I hope in your conversation to be exalted to that degree of piety that the world may see how much I abhor what I see long Lov'd, and how much I glory in repentance in God's Service, or els if the Lord chooseth to put an end to my worldly being now that hee would mercifully accept of my deathbed repentance.—Your most obedient and languishing Servant, Rochester."

Production of Malt Drops Off.

Washington, D. C.—Whether or not less beer is being drunk, the United States production of malt—important brewing material—is falling rapidly, according to the commerce department. The census of manufacturers discloses a decrease of nearly 16 per cent in value of malt produced in 1927, compared with 1925.
