REPORT CLUB WORK AT THE STATE FAIR

BOYS AND GIRLS SHOW WELL IN VARIOUS PROJECTS

Many Prizes Secured by Clubs of the Project. Individuals and Teams Return Last of Week.

The following story was told by George Jenkins, assistant county agent, concerning the prize winners at the State fair last week.

The stock judging team consisted of Dick Martin, Donald Jackson and Floyd McMullen. Gerald Haddox and Walther Ott also went as two high point club members in the county. Ernest Cox went also. Walther Ott left Thursday going with the car of stock from the county. The other boys accompanied George Jenkins on Saturday, arriving in Salem Saturday night.

Sunday morning they attended church in company with Mr. Phipps, who formerly lived on the project. During the afternoon the boys groomed the stock which was to be shown the fore part of the week. They were all kept busy showing the animals in various classes during the first of the week.

Monday morning all dairy classes were shown and the animals sent by Umatilla county club members made very creditable showing winning a first and second in Junior Jersey calf class and second, fourth, sixth, seventh, ninth and tenth in the Holstein class, all these animals placing in the money.

The stock judging contest between teams from many Oregon counties was held on Monday. Dick Martin of Hermiston won fifth place for individual score in this contest the Umatilla county team placing ninth.

The sheep sent to the fair by club members from the county also made a creditable showing with a yearling ewe owned by Dick Martin and one by Floyd McMullen placing second and third respectively.

In the open class the animals owned by Ernest Cox placed third, Donald DeMoss fourth, Bruce Follett fifth, Melvin Follett sixth, Albert Kennings seventh, John Bensele eighth and Paul Baker of Stanfield tenth.

A pen of fat hogs owned by Glen Pierson placed third in market litter contest. A single fat barrow sent by Morris Pierson placed ninth in that class. A junior sow pig sent by Clement Stockard was awarded ninth place in this entry.

A pen of wild turkeys from Pilot Rock owned by Chester Bracher was awarded sixth place and created considerable attention in the poultry division.

In the Umatilla county club booth the exhibit which is made up of sewing, cooking, canning and baking sent by Home Economics club members, 8 ribbons were placed.

A great deal of credit is due to the efficient men and careful attention given the boys who went to the fair and exhibited the animals. Walther Ott, Gerald Haddox and Floyd McMullen each entered the contest competing for a heifer calf which was given to the outstanding calf club boy or girl with either Holstein, Guernsey or Jersey calf. As his contest was not completed when Floyd and Gerald returned with Mr. Yeager they were freed to withdraw. Walther Ott was able to finish this work and won second place to the most outstanding Jersey calf club member in the state. The basis of award in this contest was: Herd-manship 25 per cent, showmanship, 25 per cent; record book, 25 per cent, and the animal, 25 per cent.

(Instrumentation.)

The instrumentation is as follows: Five cornets, 6 clarinets, 3 altos, 2 slide trombones, 1 bass, 1 snare drum, 1 bass drum, 1 baritone, 1 tenor horn.

This band was organized last October from entirely new material with the exception of three boys who had had some previous experience in band work. The players range in age from ten years up to seventeen and include pupils from the fourth to the tenth grade.

Every member of the band was

also a member of one or more of the state agricultural or home-making clubs. It is the only club band in Oregon and perhaps the only 106 per cent club band of its size in the United States.

The director, Mr. R. J. Maaske, is a graduate of Nebraska university, and was formerly captain and drum

major of the reserve officers training corps band of seventy pieces.

The band played four days at the State fair, as the guests of the Fair Board this fall, going down Monday and returning Friday of last week. The band members now have new suits and caps.

The light, fast team of the visitors was unable to gain through the heavier Hermiston line. The Condon team showed more aggressiveness and fight than the local team. At times the Hermiston team showed flashes of power but the team as a whole played a listless game.

End runs by "Smithy" and line plunges by "Brick" Addleman were bright spots of the Hermiston offense. Hermiston will have to play a better brand of ball to defeat Heppner here next Saturday.

FARM TOUR ARRANGED NEXT TUESDAY, OCTOBER 9

Start Will be Made From Hotel and Will Include Inspection of Several Farm Crops.

Tuesday, October 9, there is to be a farm tour for the purpose of acquainting farmers and those interested with the various crops, and for the basis of an economic conference which will probably be held in January.

The tour will be under the direction of G. H. Jenkins, assistant county agent, and farmers and other interested are asked to meet at the hotel at 2 P. M. Among other things they will visit farms where corn is grown for silage, sweet clover for pasture and also see a demonstration patch of Ladino clover, which shows much promise as a crop. Studies of these and other crops and practices will be made. B. S. Bessee, farm management specialist from the state college will accompany the tour.

FARM BUREAU VOTE REWARD OF \$100 FOR CONVICTION OF POULTRY THIEVES

The regular meeting of the Umatilla Project Farm Bureau was held at Columbia school house Saturday night. The principal topic discussed was chicken thievery in this locality. It was decided to offer a \$100 reward for the conviction of any one stealing chickens in this district. A number of men from various parts of the project were appointed to be present at a meeting Tuesday evening at the assistant county agent's office.

At the meeting Tuesday evening Sheriff R. T. Cookingham was present and deputized these men to help apprehend chicken thieves.

At the close of the meeting Saturday night the Farm Bureau presented Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Canfield, who are leaving soon for California, with a silver tray and framed motto, as a slight token of the esteem in which they were held by the community.

FUGITIVE CHURCH TREASURER CAUGHT

Winnipeg, Manitoba.—Clinton S. Carnes, missing treasurer of the home mission board of the Southern convention at Atlanta, Ga., was held here for American authorities.

Carnes admitted his identity after his arrest here and told police he was ready to return to the southern city without extradition proceedings to face a charge of misappropriating more than \$1,000,000 of the church funds.

The prisoner was taken before a police court and booked as "wanted in Atlanta." Police said he would not be questioned by them. He remained silent, refusing to discuss the charges against him or his whereabouts since his departure from Atlanta, August 15.

Carnes was said to have arrived in Winnipeg unaccompanied three weeks ago and was under police surveillance for several days before his identification. He had taken steps to establish himself in business here, police said. The Atlanta man was rooming with a private family here and had carefully concealed his identity. He had a large sum of money, police said. It was pointed out that a waiver of extradition was unnecessary in delivering the man to American authorities as immigration authorities could arrange his deportation, turning him over to American officials at the border.

Fred E. Lukens, Idaho secretary, was re-elected president of the National Secretaries of States association at its annual convention held in the Black Hills of South Dakota.

The Italian foreign office denied officially a report that Premier Mussolini would attend the wedding of Gene Tunney and Miss Mary Lauder, expected to be held at Sorrento soon.

John Albert Tiffin Hull, for 20 years a member of the house of representatives from Iowa, died at his home in Clarendon, Va., from an attack of heart disease. He was 87 years of age.

B. C. Scandrett of St. Paul, general solicitor of the Northern Pacific railway became vice president October 1, with general jurisdiction, subject to the president, over all departments of the road.

Washington, D. C.—A contract for carrying mail between San Francisco and Manila by way of Yokohama, Kobe, Shanghai and Hong Kong was awarded to the Dollar Steamship lines of San Francisco, Postmaster-General New has announced.
